

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KRAMER RACES TO FRONT

Wins Five-Mile Run in Fast Time at Mohawk Games.

COMES CLOSE TO RECORD

William J. Kramer, of the Long Island Athletic Club, raced to an impressive victory in the Diamond meet of the Mohawk Athletic Club in the 22d Regiment Armory last night.

The track measured 176 yards to the lap and Kramer started one yard in front of the limit men, who made up the entire field, with the exception of Huysman...

The fast pace told on the less hardy athletes, and one by one they quit the race, but the Long Island man seemed to improve, and at three miles he had passed all but a scant few in 14:55.

The last of the preliminary meetings was held yesterday, and this will be supplemented by a final review meeting, so that those in charge have every prospect of being able to get the list out by April 1.

While in this city a few days ago Elias E. Strawn, of Chicago, president of the United States Golf Association, expressed confidence in the belief that the new system of handicapping so as to determine eligibility for the next amateur championship would prove successful.
