

NEW YORK IN DANGER AS REDS DRAW NEAR

BAR THIEVING RUNNERS. Customs Officials to Keep Hotel Grafters Off Piers. LEADER A BROADWAYITE. Latin-Americans Are Lured to Boarding Houses and Robbed—One Lost \$600 Diamond.

The customs officials have been receiving complaints of late from travelers from Southern waters who have been enticed by smooth-tongued individuals whom they met on the steamship piers to certain boarding houses and then robbed or otherwise imposed upon.

WICKERSHAM PROBING BANK COLLECTIONS. Questions Right of New York Clearing House to Fix Charges for Out-of-Town Checks. PRECEDENT MAY BE SET. Rule of Discretion Waiving Cost in Certain Localities Under Scrutiny—Fair, Say Bankers.

Washington, Aug. 13.—A collateral phase of the so-called "money trust," it developed to-day is being investigated by Attorney General Wickersham. The inquiry, which may affect clearing house associations throughout the country, revolves about the rule of the New York Clearing House Association requiring its members to charge a specified sum for the collection of out-of-town checks drawn on certain parts of the country and at the same time giving them discretion whether to make charges for similar collections in other localities.

A careful and thorough study of the workings of this rule is being made by the Attorney General, it is said, to determine whether the Sherman anti-trust law or the national banking act is being violated. If action is taken, it will stand as a precedent for all clearing house associations having similar rules.

While officials of the Department of Justice are reticent in regard to the inquiry, it is learned that the Attorney General may refer the whole question to the Secretary of the Treasury for remedial measures by the Controller of the Currency, if it is found that the law is being technically violated through the growth of years, or that the practice, while not illegal, seems against public policy.

According to the rule of the New York Clearing House Association, the banks composing its membership are compelled to charge one-tenth of one per cent for the collection of checks payable in most of the states in the East and Central West, while the charge for the Far South and Far West is one-quarter of one per cent.

Representatives of the Department of Justice have recently been in conference with the manager of the New York Clearing House Association to ascertain the facts. The Clearing House Association, it is understood, has pointed out that, in addition to the cost of collection, an charge is fair and necessary, because a customer is permitted to draw on an out-of-town check at once, the bank receiving no interest during the period of collection.

These collections by New York banks have been variously estimated at from \$5,000,000 to \$17,000,000 yearly. The question was inquired into by the House money trust committee during its recent sessions in New York, with William Shearer, manager of the New York Clearing House Association, on the stand.

TYPHOID FEVER SPREADS. Many Cases in Woodhaven and Union Course, Queens. The typhoid fever which has prevailed in Woodhaven, Queens, has now spread to the adjoining village of Union Course, Dr. H. W. Morsch, of Forest Parkway, said yesterday that he had nineteen typhoid patients at the present time, and judging from what he had been told by other physicians there were a hundred and fifty typhoid fever patients sufferers in Woodhaven and Union Course.

There were three deaths from the disease in Woodhaven yesterday. One of the victims was Miss Hermine Stark, of Ferry street, sister of Dr. Charles Stark, assistant house surgeon at St. Mary's Hospital, Jamaica.

On Monday night Harry Cullmer, an architect, of No. 471 Benedict avenue, Woodhaven, and his two daughters, aged six and four years, were taken to the Methodist Episcopal Hospital, Brooklyn, suffering from the disease. Mrs. Cullmer was left with a one-week old baby in charge of a trained nurse. Yesterday Mrs. Cullmer was said to be showing symptoms of typhoid fever.

Dr. Morsch said the origin of the epidemic was still a mystery. He did not think it would be fair to blame the water supply until the most exhaustive tests had been made.
