New York Does Nothing to Turn Aliens Into Good Citizens, Woman Says.

What is the State of New York doing to turn the millions of immigrants who pour into this port every year into citizens? Nothing at all. The United States hands them out naturalization papers, and a New York State lets it go at that.

Miss Parker told the members of the Woman Suffrage Study Club something about the league's work at a meeting yesterday afternoon at the headquarters of the New York State Suffrage Association, No. 150 Madison avenue.

Work at Ellis Island.

The New York-New Jersey committee of the league for immigrants, of which John Hays Hammond is chairman, takes up its work right at Ellis Island. It has alert young agents, who meet the newly arrived there.

What Educators Do.

"All we ask of these educators," Miss Parker said, "is that they shall be trained nurses, have social experience and be able to teach English, housekeeping and a few things like that. Not much to ask of one person, is it? They must be able to teach the mothers, because the mothers won't go to the public schools; we must take the public schools to the mothers."
