

SMITH BROTHERS WIN FROM BRITISH GOLFERS

Alec and Macdonald Defeat Vardon and Ray in 36-Hole 4-Ball Match at Wykagyl.

GREAT PRAISE FOR OUIMET

New Open Champion Will Be Travers's Chief Rival for Amateur Honors Is Prediction.

Alec Smith and his brother Macdonald defeated Edward Ray and Harry Vardon, the famous English golfers, by 3 up and 2 to play in a 36-hole four-ball match yesterday over the links of the Wykagyl Country Club.

So heavy did it rain that the players and gallery of nearly a thousand found it necessary to find shelter in the clubhouse at the end of the first nine holes.

The Smith brothers had become no less than 4 up and the Britons had not been near winning even so much as a hole.

After luncheon there was a shift in the weather. The casual water on some of the fairways had disappeared for the most part, but the ground was quite soft and there was no run to the ball.

An amusing incident happened at the seventh, which was the first hole the Smiths won in the afternoon. The hole was 134 yards long.

Winning the ninth, Vardon and Ray were only 2 down, and they further reduced the margin at the next, when Vardon brought off a long put for a two.

The best ball cards follow:

FIRST ROUND. Smith brothers—4 4 5 3 3 2 4 4—34. Vardon and Ray—5 4 5 3 3 4 4 6—38.

Several professional players were in the gallery and were overheard talking about the feat of the amateur.

"What a marvelous player!" etc. Oulmet's achievement notwithstanding, Vardon and Ray continue to attract their galleries and have a series of engagements booked for the remainder of their stay in America.

It is considered probable that several American professionals will visit England again next year.

SUFFRAGISTS LOOK FOR MORE VICTORIES

Hail Opportunity to Centre Fight for Movement in Congress.

GOAL OF THE FOUNDERS

Ida Husted Harper Says That Since 1869 Aim Has Been to Secure National Legislation.

London, Sept. 4.—Only the dyed-in-the-wool suffragist, who for years has eaten and slept and dreamed and had her being with suffrage as the dominant thought, can know what this summer's exile in Europe has meant for those of us who came over for the Budapest congress and returned.

From the time the National Woman's Suffrage Association was organized in New York City, in May, 1852, its dominant object has been to concentrate the movement in Congress.

It is in other words, the character of the men who hold the balance of power in the constituency of a number of states is such that a majority vote in favor of enfranchising women is practically hopeless.

Long and Difficult Fight.

Yet this was the task imposed on the women of the nation in order to win their political freedom—that they must obtain the consent of the majority of the men in every state—and before the series of wonderful successes, which began in the State of Washington in 1910, they had made this attempt through over twenty strenuous campaigns and been successful only twice—in Colorado and Idaho!

No, there is one much better, it is a statute law of punishment that has been and hind it the support of both women and men.

TUESDAY. BREAKFAST.—Parina, bacon, with tomatoes, waffles, coffee.

LUNCHEON.—Kipped herring, fried eggplant with onions, cherry biscuit, tea.

DINNER.—Spiced and roasted ham (cold), spiced currants, French potato balls, with cream sauce, baked succotash, peach layer cake, cream, coffee.

FRIED EGGPLANT.—When frying eggplant put a few sliced onions in the pan. This makes a change from the ordinary dish of this kind.

CHERRY BISCUIT.—Roll out a light biscuit dough. Place here and there, on top, spoonfuls of cherry preserve and fold the dough over, sandwich fashion. Then cut into biscuits and bake them.
