BRONX COMMUTERS HAPPY

P. S. C. Cuts New York Central Fares to Upriver Points. The Public Service Commission ordered the New York Central & Hudson River Railroad Company yesterday to reduce its one-way fares on the Harlem and Hudson River divisions, in the Bronx, starting from the Grand Central Terminal, as follows:

On the Harlem division, to Botanical Gardens, from 20 to 15 cents; to Williamsbridge, from 22 to 18 cents; to Woodlawn, from 25 to 20 cents; and to Wakefield, from 28 to 22 cents. On the Hudson River division, to Marble Hill, from 22 to 18 cents; to Spuyten Duyvil, from 24 to 18 cents; to Riverdale, from 28 to 22 cents; and to Mount St. Vincent, from 28 to 22 cents.

The object of the order is to adjust certain inequalities in rates complained of by the Taxpayers' Alliance of the Bronx. The commission has called a hearing for November 21, at 2:30 p. m., to inquire into the service rendered by the New York City Interborough Railroad Company, the Southern Boulevard Railroad Company and the Bronx Traction Company regarding the necessity for more cars and tracks.
