SULLIVANS START WAR IN THE THIRD

"Paddy" Whetting Scalping Knife, with Weather Eye on Fitzgerald.

THINKS SENATOR DIDN'T PLAY FAIR

Half Brother Captures "Big Tim's" Name for His Club, and Will Fight for Leadership.

There is to be a fight to the finish between Senator Fitzgerald and Patrick H. Sullivan for the Democratic leadership of the 3d Assembly District this autumn. The fight was called off last year because it was felt that warfare would hurt Mr. Sullivan's chances of election. Now, however, the Sullivan organization has come out in support of Mitchell, Glynn and Wilson. It passed resolutions to that effect at its last meeting.

In addition to the leadership of the 3d district Sullivan is thinking seriously of trying this year for the nomination to Congress in the 11th District, to succeed George W. Loft.

John Baker, secretary of the Sullivan organization, would not say yesterday what the resolutions in favor of the President, Governor and Mayor meant. It was opposed to the leadership of Charles F. Murphy. However, they are looked upon as rather significant.

"The President, Governor and Mayor are Democrats, are they not?" said Mr. Baker. "We believe in supporting all Democrats. Of course, if Mr. Murphy is to be leader of Tammany Hall for the remainder of his life, as he said the other day, we will be for him. However, you never know what changes there will be, and we are going to be with the country organization. We are mainly interested now in capturing the leadership of the 3d Assembly District."

The fight against Fitzgerald was started because "Paddy" Sullivan, a half brother of "Big Tim," believed the Senator had not treated "Big Tim" right. He had belittled the Sullivan and started to build up an organization of his own. The fight to drive Fitzgerald, who took "Big Tim's" place as leader several years ago, had every prospect for success when it was called off last year.

Now the Sullivan forces believe they have got the leadership practically snatched. They have captured the name of the Timothy D. Sullivan Association for their organization, which for years was the name of the regular club. They did this by going to Albany and incorporating under that name. The regular organization had never taken the trouble to take legal steps to protect the name. The Fitzgerald outfit now will have to go under the name of the regular Tammany Club of the 3d Assembly District.

The Fitzgerald crowd still has the old clubhouse, at No. 25 Bowery, but the property belongs to the estate of "Big Tim," and the Sullivans are the landlords of their foes. The rent paid by the Fitzgeralds for the two upper floors, \$1,500 a year, is a big drain on their finances. The Sullivan club is paying not more than \$20 a year for its clubrooms, at No. 29 Bowery. Harry Oxford is president and "Paddy" Sullivan and "Larry" Mulligan are directors.

The Sullivan organization now has 200 members, and it is growing rapidly every day, according to Mulligan, while the regular organization is losing strength. One of the latest recruits to the Sullivans is Assemblyman John B. Golden, who was nominated and elected by the regulars.

There was much dissatisfaction last autumn because Murphy insisted upon the nomination of George W. Loft in the 11th District to take the place of "Big Tim." Loft does not live in the district, and old friends of Sullivan felt that the nomination should go to them. Senator Fitzgerald wanted the nomination, but Murphy told him he could not have it. Loft has always put up shrews of war for the organization, and as he wanted to go to Congress, that was all there was to it. Harry Applebaum, an old friend of Sullivan, ran independently, but he made a poor showing.

The 11th Congress District, in addition to taking in a large part of the 3d Assembly District, also includes parts of the 1st, 5th and 6th districts. The 8th is controlled by "Christy" Sullivan, "Paddy" however, is not sure whether he would have the support of "Christy" in his ambition to go to Congress. It probably will depend upon whether he believes "Paddy" will be able to capture the leadership.

KLAW WANTS ORDINANCE

Would Deprive Agencies of Right to Sell Theatre Tickets.

Arthur C. Train, Assistant District Attorney in charge of the theatre inquiry, had a talk with Marc Klaw, of Klaw & Blanger, yesterday, and is to see him again to-morrow.

Mr. Klaw declared that nothing could be accomplished by any agreement among managers, nor did he think the plan of having authorized agencies, able to purchase tickets at a slight reduction so as to sell at face value, would work well. He thought there would soon be a swarm of unauthorized men buying from the regular agents and selling at an advance.

"I have no very definite ideas," said Mr. Klaw, "but I would favor an ordinance taking the ticket privileges away from all newsstands. That would restrict the sale to a few who could be easily dealt with."
