

RECORD CROWD SEES SCOTLAND TRIUMPH

Only One Goal for English Internationalists to Opponents' Three.

LEAGUE RACES GROWING TIGHTER

Blackburn Rovers Only Team Which Has Already Clinched Its Title.

London, April 4.—The greatest of all international football matches, Scotland vs. England, which is the last one of the season, took place today at Hampden Park, Glasgow, and attracted a tremendous crowd of 115,000 persons, who saw a splendid game end in a victory for Scotland by a score of 3 to 1.

The leaders of the first division of the English Association League—the Blackburn Rovers—now make the championship certain, and further improved their fine record by winning their home game with the Bolton Wanderers by a score of 2 to 1.

Stuyvesant Lad in Lead in Century Race Till Near End, When He Tired.

Both contests were a battery fought and Handy won his century marathon, 100 yds. Vollmer, of Stuyvesant; Philip Herbert, of Horace Mann, and Handy dove off in the 100-yard race. At the flash of the gun they left the take-off as a unit. Vollmer was inches in front at the end of the first twenty-five yards. In the next ten yards Herbert crawled to the lead, and when he reached the end of the tank he picked up a few more inches on the turn.
