## COSTUMES FOR TENNIS WEEK

Peasant Girdles, Wide Crepe-Covered Hats and Soutache-Embroidered Linens Are Features of Clothes Appropriate to Wear at the Tournament.

SUMMER places at which tennis tournaments take place annually are during the six days of the contest veritable paradises for young people. The men, of course, need not bother about additions to the hot weather wardrobe. They simply pack a double supply of tropical serge suits, white flannels, silk skirts and white shoes, and are ready for the social fray. But the girl who has been continually on the go since the first days of summer knows that her wardrobe must be replenished. So she loses no time about ordering a half-dozen new frocks to be delivered several days

The brim of this hat may be exaggeratedly wide if it is also straight, and will shade the face; in fact, no shape is more in keeping with a peasant girdled bodice. The white satin skirt of this frock is draped at left side and back and trimmed at the ankles with a double ruching in black tulle. The lighter toned costume, in oyster gray, has a triple box-pleated long overskirt held down at the top by a deep girdle of black moire ribbon. Above the waistline this girdle runs halfway to the bust of an oyster gray lingerie blouse, whose embroidered pattern is exposed by the slashed out fronts of a hip-length jacket. A half turned-over white linen collar starts well away from low-rolling fronts, and on the conventional coat sleeves are widely turned-back cuffs.

the two linen tailored suits fancies a cerise taffeta veiled with a widely flounced accordion-pleated tunic in cerise tulle. Silver rose garlands outlining the deeply pointed décolletage of its net bodice cross below the bust and edge a narrow taffeta girdle.

Extra wraps of two types—in case of unseasonably cool weather—attract those women who expect to witness the next tournament. One of these wraps is the knitted silk sweater. The other is a half-long circular cape of white gabardine, lined with colored silk.

### Summery Accessories

**Delicate Charm of Frills Repeated in Parasols Belts and Bags.**

THE present style of net, organdie and lace frills for the neck is most flattering to the majority of women. The broken line of organdie or net is softening to the face, and the height of the collar at the back frames the neck becomingly. Here is drawn a smart collar that could be tacked into the neck of a shirtwaist. It is of white organdie with a roll collar and

vestee, piped with a hemstitched band of maize color linen. Three crocheted frogs fasten the vestee. The smartness of this collar is emphasized by a black moire tie, which goes underneath the collar and hangs down. This collar is in rose, tan, maize and blue. Price, \$6.50. The comfort of a low collar and the trimness of a high one are combined in a collar and vestee of white batiste and rose color linen, cut in scallops. The body of the vestee is rose color handkerchief linen, trimmed with pearl buttons laid in clusters of two. A ruffle of fine batiste, daintily tucked, is edged with Valenciennes lace. This attractive collar and vestee is in green, rose and tan. Price, \$6.50.

Pouch Bag in Moire Silk. A useful moire silk pouch bag is being shown by a good shop. It is of black moire, lined in white moire of good quality. The only trimming is the ribbon handle, with silver slides and a silk tassel. This bag may be used for many occasions. In black, navy blue and white. Price, \$5.75.

Vestee Belt in Black. Belts are used more and more with separate waists and skirts, and all colors and designs are found. One seen to-day was of black moire with

Leather wrist watches, particularly attractive to travellers, are


shown in silver and gunmetal. Price, \$6.

preceding the opening of tournament week. First on the list comes something for mornings. If she has been literally living in white between breakfast and luncheon, she inclines now toward colors. She browses among figured crêpes and finds an attractive pink and white frock. Its pink batiste underskirt is covered to the ankles with a loosely falling overskirt in figured crêpe. This overskirt is gathered at the waistline under a geranium pink peasant girdle that buttons in front. Supported by narrow shoulder straps it goes over a white batiste peasant skirt whose low, rounded neck is finished with a cord and whose sleeves puffed midway down the upper arm are closely fitted to the elbow. Then she orders a low-crowned

which is cleverly put on as a girdle. Straight at the normal waistline the other edge of the girdle runs to a point at the centre of the early Victorian neck. In the back, where the lace drapery makes a narrow ruffle upon the hips, it is partly hidden by a bow which heads black velvet ribbon sash ends.

Draping Hood Is Novel Feature. A novel detail of the bodice is a black Chantilly-draped hood drooping half down the back and caught with small jet ornaments at the tops of long, set-in sleeves. Its widely rounded neck might be thought a bit extreme were not the chest and shoulders veiled with a semi-tulle guimpe.

Some girls are always distinguished for trimness of their tailored

centre. The black satin ribbon girdle crosses itself high over a lingerie blouse, but at the right side drops over the skirt in a single loop and a soutache embroidered end. Black silk soutache-embroidered tabs join the widely separated fronts of the box-cut little jacket, whose shawl collar and turned-over cuffs also are braid embroidered.

With each of these suits the tennis enthusiast expects to wear a small black straw sailor trimmed with clusters of white and black and with glossy cherries at back and front, with black lacquered leaves on either side.

Cerise Becoming to Brunette. One new evening frock, at least, the tennis girl must have to wear at the tournament ball. The girl with

A shop noted for its good shoes is showing a large assortment of outing shoes in buckskin, canvas and tan Russia calf. A good pair of high buckskin tennis shoes can be had for \$9—low ones for \$6. Canvas shoes, which also are correct, are shown at \$5 for high shoes and \$3.50 for low shoes.

Ruffled Bathing Suit.

Bathing suits this season are ruffled and puffed. A smart suit is of blue mohair, cut in simple style, with a pleated over-skirt. The waist has the usual short kimono sleeves. The neck is cut square and fastened at the side with crystal buttons. The suit is piped around the neck, sleeves and waist with changeable blue silk. Price, \$5.25.

A rubber bathing cap suitable for the suit described is of plain rubber, with a narrow ruffle around the edge. It is trimmed with rosettes of flowers made of rubber. Price, 45 cents.

Black canvas bathing slippers are shown at 50 cents. The same style in satin sells for \$1.50.

A New Cut Afternoon Frock.

A formal afternoon frock in a new cut is shown in the second sketch on this page. It is made of white crepe de chine of good quality. The waist, cut in kimono style, has long sleeves, trimmed

with five covered buttons of the material. Four jade buttons form the closing. The skirt is made with a yoked tunic, which has a box pleat both back and front, and the side is pleated. The yoke is fastened with jade buttons, continuing the line of the waist fastening. A narrow belt of white and green leather trims the waist. This dress comes in white, with different colored buttons. Price, \$27.50.

Ruffled Net Gown.

For evening wear the net gown has proved a great favorite. One shown by a good shop has a plain waist with short sleeves, finished by two ruffles. A wide ruffle, also of the net, falls gracefully over the bodice. The skirt has two tunics finished at the bottom by two small ruffles. A broad girdle of white satin is used. This dress is also suitable for afternoon wear. Price, \$23.50.

Slippers and Gloves.

A large variety of satin evening slippers in all colors are offered at \$5.50. Attractive rhinestone buckles are shown by the same shop. A pair of bowknot ones can be had for \$1. White doeskin gloves, an essential accessory for the week-end trip are shown at \$1.50.
