### COSTUME BALL AT NEWPORT

#### Mrs. Belmont to Entertain in Honor of the Duchess of Marlborough

Newport, R. I., July 18.—Costume parties have always had a big attraction for the members of the summer colony here in seasons past and this season is no exception to the rule. Already there are three costume dances being arranged to be given between now and the end of August, and all three promise to be brilliant affairs.

The first of these parties takes place next Friday night. It will be the Chinese ball that Mrs. Oliver H. P. Belmont is giving in honor of the Duchess of Marlborough and also for the purpose of officially opening her new Chinese tea house, which has been erected on the rear of Marble House estate. There have been between 300 and 400 invitations issued for this party, and wig makers and costume makers are busily engaged at present preparing the dresses and suits to be worn on that evening.

This will be about the last appearance of the duchess before she starts for her home in England, though Mrs. Belmont is giving a dinner for her on July 28, and the duchess will go to New York the following day for a paraty to sailing for England on the Vaderland on August 1. The duchess when she came from England brought with her a Chinese costume to be worn at this ball, and Mrs. Belmont has a costume that she had brought from China. There are to be other real Chinese costumes worn, and it is evident that many of the people who attend will be provided with quite a little education in the fads and follies of dress in that empire.

The matter of securing costumes for the ball is being taken seriously by many of the women. Expert costumers have arrived to assist in correctly grooming the cottagers. Many robes representing the period of 250 years ago will be worn and the embroidery on these will tell something of the history of China.

One hundred of the guests arrayed in their ball costumes will be found earlier in the evening at Crossways, the home of Mrs. Stuyvesant Fish, for a dinner which Mrs. Fish is giving in honor of Mrs. Belmont and her daughter.

The second costume party will be given by Mrs. Fish. It will be a floral ball and will be given on the evening of August 14. It will be one of the features of the midsummer flower show that is being given jointly by the Newport Garden Club and the Newport Horticultural Society. This show is to be given on the grounds of

Mrs. Belmont's unused Belmont, on lower Bellevue av., an ideal place for the holding of such a show, and as far as the flowers are concerned an excellent exhibition is expected.

Mrs. Fish's ball will be given in the ballroom at Crossways, and the guests, several hundred in number, will, it is said, be expected to appear in costumes representative of the flowers and plants of the garden.
