Neither Parke nor little "Mavro" ever knew just where the flashing racket wielded by Brookes was going to place the next shot.

Then Brookes and the New Zealanders settled into their peerless stride, once more and captured the eighth and tenth games, winning the set at 6-4 and with it the match.
