Block Island, R. I., Aug. 8.—The picturesque town of New Shoreham, better known to the many summer visitors as Block Island, has again opened its doors to weary sojourners from cities all over the country.

During July and August the Montauk Steamboat Company sends a boat five times a week to the island, and the sail is really part of the pleasure of the trip.

The bathing conditions this year, as always, are ideal, and Crescent Beach, just south of Clay Head, is thronged with bathers morning and afternoon.

Black Island has two hundred fresh water ponds, none of which has either visible inlet or outlet. These ponds are filled with fresh water fish, and the ardent fisherman may hire a row-boat and fish by the hour for pickerel, black bass, perch and trout.

Perhaps the most popular of all the walks is along the cliffs to the South Light. The Mohegan Bluffs rise 200 feet above the sea level and far down below us the mighty surf beats ceaselessly.
