Mrs. William H. Hyde gave a dinner at her home, 66 East 91st st., for her daughter, Miss Sylvia Hyde.



VANDERBILTS BACK HOME

Cornelius to Modernize House He Leased to Henry C. Frick.

Mr. and Mrs. Cornelius Vanderbilt are to occupy the southerly one of the 'twin Vanderbilt houses', occupying the Fifth av. block front between 51st and 52d sts.

The southerly house, the larger of the two, has been occupied for ten years by Henry C. Frick under lease, which expires in May.

Mr. Vanderbilt is going to modernize the old three-story mansion. Among these changes will include the removal of the present entrance on the avenue and the installing of a new one on 51st av.

Some paintings have been sold privately, but creditors objected and asked for an auction.

On the other hand, the accounts receivable amount to only \$19,000, and some are of doubtful value.

The pictures disposed of at private sale realized \$15,050. Their estimated cost to Blakeslee was \$8,650, so that there was a margin of profit of \$6,400.

Top Price for Colonial Suite. An old Colonial bedroom suite of San Domingo mahogany brought the top price, \$85, yesterday at the opening session of the sale at the Fifth Avenue Art Galleries of furniture from several well known estates.

Sacrifices of Husband and Friend Fail to Save Singer.

SHE WON FAME IN ROLE OF DALILA

Came to Manhattan Opera House in 1907—Was Married to Dr. Georges G. Rambaud.

Mme. Jeanne Gerville-Reache, formerly the principal French contralto of the Manhattan Opera Company, and especially remembered for her Dalila in Saint-Saëns's opera of 'Samson et Dalila' and for her impersonation of the title part in Massenet's 'La Navarraise', died yesterday afternoon at Roosevelt Hospital.

Her marriage to Dr. Rambaud, who she met in Paris, was a failure. It occurred in New Jersey before a justice of the peace on November 11, 1910, but it was not until the following January that she reported a divorce.

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LABOR MEN LOSE DANBURY FIGHT

Supreme Court Holds 200 Hatters Must Pay \$252,000 for Boycott.

Washington, Jan. 5.—Ending eleven years of litigation, the Supreme Court held today that two hundred Connecticut labor union members must pay \$252,000 damages under the Sherman anti-trust law for a nation-wide boycott of D. H. Lawrence Co. of Danbury, Conn., hat manufacturers, who refused to unionize their shops.

Justice Holmes announced the court's unanimous opinion. With brief consideration, he arrived at the conclusion that the New York federal courts were right in holding that a forbidden combination had been proved.

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MRS. WHITNEY WILL RETURN TO FRONT

May Extend Hospital Relief Work to England and Austria.

Mr. and Mrs. Gertrude Vanderbilt Whitney, wife of Harry Payne Whitney, who established a field hospital in France, where she personally directed the treatment of wounded soldiers, announced yesterday her intention to return to the front, although in this announcement there is an intimation that she will extend her work to England and Austria.

Miss Whitney, who returned to New York to spend the Christmas season, was contained in an application which she made to County Clerk Schneider asking for a certification of her passport, which action was probably caused by the exposé of fraudulent passports that have been used.

Similar action was taken by Howard Gardner Cushing, the artist, and his wife, who announced that they intended to visit France.
