

ICE ON VISTULA PERIL TO ARMY OF HINDENBURG

Russian Force North of River Can Cross and Attack in Rear.

HUNGARY MENACED FROM TWO POINTS

Grand Duke Nicholas Prepared to Advance from North and East.

Petersburg, Jan. 16.—While the advance columns of the Grand Duke's great army, north of the Vistula, are pressing on through Poland toward the East Prussian frontier, von Hindenburg's forces along the Brera continue to attack the Russian lines which block the road to Warsaw, but without making any headway.

BRITISH REMAIN OBDURATE ON DACIA

Former German Liner Evidently To Be Dispatched to Furnish Test Case.

London, Jan. 16.—There is strong reason to believe that Great Britain will not accept the American suggestion that the Dacia be permitted to go to Rotterdam. The British, however, are anxious to protect the cotton sellers from loss, and an adjustment in this direction might be reached by England purchasing the cotton supposed to be shipped on the Dacia.

WHEAT FOR BRITISH POISONED, SHE SAYS

German Barge Captain Faints as His Belgian Bride Adds Sensational Charge.

She declared that her husband had tried to poison a cargo of wheat destined for England.

SAW FLAGLESS CRUISER

Pilot Said the Karlsruhe Was Near Curacao.

A cruiser without a flag, thought by a pilot at Curacao to be the Karlsruhe, was sighted thirty-five miles off Curacao Harbor at daybreak on January 15 by an officer of the steamer Maracaibo.

Washington, Jan. 16.—President Wilson sent the following message of sympathy to-day to King Emmanuel of Italy: "I am greatly shocked at the news of the terrible calamity which has fallen upon Italy and her people. I beg to express to you and to the Italian people my sincere sympathy and that of the government and people of the United States in this moment of widespread suffering and national grief."
