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PROHIBITION PLAN GETS SETBACK IN ENGLAND

Opposition, Backed by Big Liquor Interests, Will Fight Lloyd George's Programme—Livelihood of 3,000,000 Persons Imperilled, Says Dewar.

London, April 7.—Although Lloyd George has received 80,000 letters calling for total prohibition, the operation of strapping England to the water wagon has been encountering some very considerable difficulties in the last few days.

The liquor interests are very powerful here. Not only is a great amount of capital invested in distilleries and breweries, but a very considerable proportion of the savings of people with small means is invested in them.

TABERNACLE FULL AT NIGHT MEETING

Revivalist, Stirred by Newspaper Criticism, Puts More "Pep" Into His Work.

Paterson, N. J., April 7.—As Billy Sunday would probably put it, the New York morning newspapers got under his shirt to-day, following the reading of their plain statements of this morning, he exerted himself to-night.

Sunday felt the criticism of his work and his reception so keenly he made an attack on the New York newspaper reporters this afternoon, calling them "stinking little liars."

Sunday alluded in his afternoon sermon to the announcement that Frank Tannenbaum, Carlo Trecca, Jim Larkin and other I. W. W. high priests will hold a meeting in Turn Hall Tuesday night.

"I'm a friend of the laboring man," he said. "I'm his friend, and I don't preach any partisan religion. But, believe me, I'm not afraid of the wild-eyed agitators. Let 'em come."

Sunday was funny to-night. There was little in his sermon that appealed to the intellect, but the ribaldries were tickled. He specialized in imitations, varying all the way from a photographer taking a picture of a little girl to a portrayal of a drunken man, which was not amusing at all, because it was disgusting.

"Delighted" Wins Applause. It was soon after the first meeting began that the speaker made his verbal assault on the newspaper men.

"Sunday was a wonderful man," said a woman who had been to the meeting. "I was getting tired of the way some of these ginks put things in the newspapers that aren't true. "The story of the Jew is a shining monument in the history of the world," he said. "It makes my blood boil to hear a man calling a Jew a 'sheeny' or 'Christ killer.' If you are saved at all you will be saved by a Jew. You never see a Jew among the 'weary Wilkes,' ragged, leering panhandlers, moaning for a free meal."

"I know men sunk so low it would take an airship to get into their heads," he said. "You men here, like Comanches at a political meeting, and look like a jack rabbit eating cabbage when you go to pray."

"I used to be with him, but I'm not now. But I know that he is a man who is up to us, and we are what you are up to, and we won't."

VILLA ROUTED NEAR TAMPIO; THOUSAND LOST Carranzistas Claim Victory in Continuous Series of Actions.

PRISONERS NUMBER MORE THAN 400

Duval West, Personal Representative of President Wilson, Arrives in Mexico City.

Washington, April 7.—Complete defeat of the Villa army moving against Tampico was claimed in a message received to-night by the Carranza agency here. The dispatch said:

The military movement of the Constitutional forces under the command of Generals Gacinto, Trevino and Caballero against the Villa troops commanded by Urbina and Chao has resulted in the complete defeat of the Villistas after a series of battles near El Hano, after which the Villa forces retreated and fled to Las Palmas, where they were again routed.
