NOTE SETTLED IN ESSENTIALS

Wilson's Reply Already Nearly in Shape To Be Sent to Berlin.

WILL SEE AMBASSADOR

President Consents to Talk with Von Bernstorff Before Finishing His Answer.



Washington, June 1.—President Wilson's answer to the German note will be a demand that Germany give assurances that the attacks of its submarines against unarmed merchantmen cease at once. He will demand that Germany give assurances that the lives of non-combatants and citizens of all neutrals be safeguarded on the high seas...

These are the essentials as agreed upon to-day, but there may be some slight changes. Secretaries Bryan, Garrison and Lane each had certain ideas on some of the points that came up in the discussion, and the President asked each to submit a memorandum explaining his views in detail.

At Work on the Note. President Wilson began the preparation of his note to-night. He will confer with Count von Bernstorff, German Ambassador, at noon to-morrow, but unless the ambassador is able to give the assurances the President calls for it is most unlikely that there will be any change in the programme as outlined in the note...

Ready to Lie Like Gentlemen. As we approached the war zone rather elaborate precautions were taken to safeguard Mr. Marconi. His name was not on either the regular list of the pursuer's books, and there was a general tacit agreement among the passengers that if the St. Paul was stopped by the submarine it would "lie like gentlemen."

Anti-German Riots Again. Probably as a consequence of the Zeppelin raid, acute anti-German feelings broke out again in London at night. A mob of about 100 persons surrounded the premises in Shore-ditch of people suspected of being of German nationality and attacked the shops which had suffered in the previous rioting...

ARE SURE TORPEDO STRUCK NEBRASKAN
