

GROUT, FAVORED IN JAIL, STIRS PRISONERS' ENVY

Protest to Miss Davis Against Privileges for Perjurer.

RECEIVES VISITORS AT ALL HOURS

Court Order Is Warden's Reply—Sullivan, Also of Union Bank, Lived at Ease.

The fact that for the second time a convicted official of the defunct Union Bank of Brooklyn has been granted special privileges while a prisoner was revealed yesterday, when prisoners in the City Prison, in Raymond Street, Brooklyn, made a protest to Warden John Hayes against favors accorded to E. M. Grout, who is under sentence for perjury.

The first official of the bank to be convicted was David A. Sullivan, former president, who was treated as an honored guest at Sing Sing.

At the jail the prisoners complain that Mr. Grout is allowed to receive visits from members of his family, his law firm and his attorney, Stephen Baldwin, any day of the week, and as late as 9 o'clock at night. The usual visiting hours are from 2 to 4 o'clock in the afternoon.

This privilege has been granted to Mr. Grout by an order of Supreme Court Justice Dean Potter, who is associated with Mr. Baldwin, asked for it on the ground that it was necessary that Mr. Grout be allowed to consult with his family and counsel at night because of his many and varied ailments, which would prevent him from completing his efforts to prepare an appeal if he had only the usual hours for consultation.

LOVE FOR SAME GIRL LOCKS HIM UP AGAIN

Youth Paroled After Slashing Her—Quarrel with Father Over Repentance Gift.

Thomas Mangieri, nineteen, was sent to the Elmira Reformatory three years ago for slashing the face of his sweetheart. He was paroled last fall and promptly renewed attention to the same girl, Josephine Samma, of 231 Lafayette Street. So successful was his suit that the girl's father finally gave his consent to the marriage, provided she get \$2,000, according to an old Sicilian custom, for his daughter's disfigurement.

HARVARD MAN A SUICIDE

Business Reverses Worried H. W. Wellington—Wife Away. Henry W. Wellington, a member of the Harvard Club and a former manufacturer of cordage in Boston, committed suicide in his apartment, 4 West Fortieth Street, yesterday morning. The body was found by Dr. John Welz-miller, who shared the apartment with him, lying on the floor of the living room with an automatic pistol by his side and a bullet hole in his head.

FATHER CONVICTED OF KILLING CHILD

Quarrel with Wife Led Liebman to Drop Sleeping Boy and Girl Five Floors.


