Stalwart English Tweeds

B. ALTMAN & CO.

The riding habit of stout Scotch tweeds is always good, especially for country wear. A well tailored model, made practically short with large patch pockets, has a coat faced with rubber and nicely lined with satin. The breeches are reinforced with buckskin, backed with chamois. The cost is \$26. In a lovely "Forestry cloth" this model is \$32.

ABERCROMBIE & FITCH CO.

The new autumn model for sports or general country and knockabout wear, is made of a much recommended "thornproof" tweed; this splendid material is also cravenetted. The skirt is invisibly fastened up the back, and buttoned up the front, so that it may be used also for riding astride. The straight Norfolk coat is belted in suede, and the collar faced with the same. \$45. A hat to match at \$5, has a stitched brim. A new waterproof tent is being shown, made of a very thin light verdalite material, which may be folded into a small compass and packed in a case, the whole weighing not more than 3 1/4 pounds; size, 4x7 feet. Price, \$11. An unusually steady wooden camp stool, with wooden top, folds flat and is conveniently light in weight, 40 cents. A new lot of real Navajo blankets for camping or "dens," and also specially attractive on the veranda, cost \$12 and up.



Two green parrot tails, with head attached, at the back are the only trimming. The gown, from Lane Bryant (\$27.50), is of blue serge with taffeta bottom to tunic and sleeves. The collar is of white silk, and the belt, attached behind, ties in front.

I saw also charming little batiste gowns for \$3.95, which were most moderate in price. They were trimmed with very wide bands of fine lace, imitation filet, about the empire waist line and low neck and sleeves.

A dainty housegown of crepe de chine, with the high waistline on elastic, was finished with a pleated heading at the accordion pleated skirt. The upper part with kimono elbow sleeves had tiny ruffles of pleated crepe and was simply embroidered in rope silk. Price, \$7.50.

KNOX, HATTER.

Severely plain is a wide brimmed sailor in pearl gray French felt, with no trimming save tiny ornaments made by stitching rose colored beads around the crown: \$10. Another sailor, of hatter's plush, has a novel trimming of four tiny grosgrain bows applied flat against the crown. Price, \$12. More picturesque and less tailored in effect is a suede cloth hat with a medium large floppy brim, in a wonderful rich violet and embroidered in worsted in a lighter shade of lavender: \$10. Copied from those worn by the French peasant are large cloth "barettes," which are tremendously popular for sports wear, especially in white, though they come also in bright red and green: \$3.

JOHN WANAMAKER.

A wide black velvet sailor has the slightest tilt to each side, just enough to attract attention and yet be almost indecipherable. It is trimmed across the back with two daring green parrot wings and heads: \$16.

The new velvet "tricorn" shape is made in "African" brown with a moire ribbon rosette confining two flaring wings horizontally placed across the crown: \$10.50.

Special prices are being offered on some very attractive Chinese grass rugs in tan and green, the 9x12 size being offered for \$5.75, and the 3x6 for only \$1.



An exceedingly clever little waistcoat for the early autumn is made of good quality black chiffon velvet. A flaring collar at the back and turnback revers add distinctive notes. An attractive peplum is deeply scalloped and piped in black satin: \$7.95. In an unusual line of white Georgette crepe blouses is one whose lower part of pussy willow taffeta was attached to the crepe in deep hemstitched points. Price, \$5.75.

BONWIT, TELLER & CO.

Particularly practical for early autumn wear are the new blouses made of Jersey silk. This model, made with a high collar, convertible for sports wear, has a smart black tie drawn through slides and tied in a bow in front. Price, \$5.50. The new ostrich neck pieces are made flat to resemble one long plume and are fastened with a bunch of small richly tinted roses. Price, \$4.50. Particularly dainty are neckwear sets, hand hemstitched and of exquisitely fine organdie in pastel shades. Price, \$1.95.

Among the articles shown in the August furniture sale, I saw comfortable Morris chairs, with imitation leather cushion, and frame finished in mahogany, which had been reduced to \$14.
