DRASTIC MEASURE TAKEN
TO FORCE AID OF GREECE
AFTER DEMAND ON KING

750 SOLDIERS DROWNED WHEN GERMAN
SUBMARINE SANK FRENCH TRANSPORT

London, Nov. 20.—A thrilling story of how a German submarine sank a French transport in the Mediterranean, when 750 men were drowned, is told in a letter dated Algiers, received from H. Bacon, an officer aboard the steamer Lady Plymouth, homeward bound to Cardiff.

"We were steaming along when the captain observed a lifeboat," says the letter. He steered straight for it to investigate, but found it empty, although there were signs that it had been occupied, for it contained food and water. The name of the boat was Dahra, of La Rochelle.

Serbs Crossing Border

INVADER BARS
RETREAT ROAD

Teutons Push Close to
Montenegrin Border—
Albanians Threaten.

London, Nov. 21.—The Allies have declared a blockade of Greece. The Athens newspapers, says an Exchange Telegraph dispatch, publish a communication issued by the British Legation, stating that the Entente Powers have declared an economic and commercial blockade of Greece. The Cabinet afterward sat from 9 o'clock in the evening until 3 in the morning.

ITALIANS' GUNS
SWEEP GORIZIA

Bombard Austrian Forts
on Isonzo and Barracks
in the City.

Paris, Nov. 20.—With their guns pounding steadily at the forts protecting Gorizia and sweeping the barracks in the city itself, the Italians are slowly battering their way nearer the Isonzo stronghold. Vienna tells of a vigorous bombardment by the enemy artillery, while Rome tells of heavy fire directed at Austrian batteries on heights east of the city and in orchards and gardens near Gorizia.

CRAMPS' SHIPYARD
FIRE INCENDIARY

Railroad Men Hold Blaze in
Check Until Firemen Arrive.

Philadelphia, Nov. 20.—Flames which swept through the second floor of the brass foundry of Cramps' shipyard to-night were kept in check by the crew of a Pennsylvania Railroad switching engine until the firemen arrived. The railroad men ran the locomotive on a siding alongside the burning structure, and after attaching a hose to the engine tank played a stream on the blaze.

AUSTRIAN OFFICIAL

The statement issued at Vienna says: "The fighting in the Gorizia district continues. The bridgehead at Gorizia was again unsuccessfully attacked at several points. The town was vigorously bombarded for one hour from the northern portion of the plateau of Dobordo the enemy renewed his attacks with strong forces against our positions on the northern slopes of Monte San Michele and in the sector of San Martino. Hand to hand fighting repeatedly developed, but the Italians were everywhere repulsed."

GUNS SHATTER
GERMAN WORKS

Allies' Monitors Bombard Ost-
end, but Are Driven Off.
Says Berlin.

London, Nov. 20.—In Belgium and in the Somme district, the Allies' guns have shattered positions held by the enemy. On the whole western front the artillery duel continues, varied by occasional hand grenade battles. Enemy monitors, which shelled Ostend, says Berlin, were driven off.

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"A MATTER OF HOURS"

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London, Nov. 20.—The correspondent at Berne of the Central News says: "Diplomats understand that an Italian declaration of war on Germany is only a matter of hours."
Meanwhile, the plight of the Serb armies has become still more desperate. The forces which defended Nish have left only a very narrow avenue of escape, and that is growing narrower. Old Serbia as it existed before the last Balkan war is completely overrun by hostile forces.
The Serbian armies, which have been for the better part of two months gradually falling back before the Teutonic advance from the north, are now reaching territory close to the Montenegrin border. Operating in the region west of the Kopsanik Planina, the forces of Field Marshal von Mackensen are pressing on Novipazar, which, roughly, is only twenty-five miles from the frontier. Berlin announces the taking of Raska, a dozen miles to the northeast of Novipazar, and of Dren, approximately the same distance directly to the east. The Germans have taken 2,800 more Serb prisoners.
Twenty-five miles to the northwest of Novipazar the Austrian advance has reached Senica, narrowing appreciably the gap through which the Serbian retreat must be conducted. The army of General von Gallwitz is approaching Pristina, which also is threatened by the Bulgarians coming from the northeast and southeast.
A Constantinople dispatch to the "Berliner Zeitung" reports that Albanian troops have been concentrated along the Serbian border to hold back the Serbians in their retreat. The withdrawing to Scutari, as the way to Monastir is cut off.
Bulgarian successes at Katschank Pass, Tetovo and Babuna Pass have been confirmed, and the Kosovo plateau, where the Serbians expected
