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Miller of Columbia, Rose Quickly to Gridiron Fame

Star of Unbeaten Eleven Had Only Two Years' Experience on High School Team.

Howard Miller, the Columbia quarterback, who sprang into football fame this year, is a dependable drop kicker, a field general of high calibre and has few equals as a runner in a broken field after punts or kick-offs.

Miller's rise to fame during this season was slow but succeeding quickly. He approached the zenith of his power when he kicked two goals from the field in the New York University game, one from the ten-yard mark and one from the twenty-yard mark.

Miller's feats on the gridiron are the more marvellous when it is remembered that he weighs only 142 pounds. His previous experience was practically nil, the amounting all told to two years on the New Rochelle High School eleven.

He responded to the first call for Columbia's eleven, and in the opening game of the season his hold on the position of quarterback was none too secure.

He showed poor headwork in the first two games, but was quick to learn, and his play against Wesleyan on Thursday was well-nigh flawless.

Despite the sudden thrust into the limelight which his football prowess has brought him, Miller is the most reserved of students on the campus.

When the contest ended by his 45-yard kick that defeated Wesleyan, he blushed and stammered a few words before the cheering and shouting crowd.

KIVIAT INQUIRY ON AGAIN TO-DAY

Preliminary Facts Brought Out at First Meeting of Investigating Committee.

Only preliminary evidence was heard by the special committee composed of George J. Turner, president of the Amateur Athletic Union, and Edward E. Babb, of Boston, appointed by the Board of Governors to hear the appeal of Kiviat.

At the culmination of the colloquy, the committee issued a statement in which it stated that in its opinion the evidence either direct or circumstantial, to justify the decision of the registration committee and the subsequent action of the Board of Managers of the Rockford club, of the Three I League, claimed Lamline under the reserve clause.

Lamline Goes to Reds. Cincinnati, Nov. 27.—The National Baseball Commission yesterday ordered the services of Fred Lamline to the St. Louis club of the National League.

Ex-Congressman Murray L. Hurlburt appeared with John T. Deoling in behalf of the athlete. He made it plain that he had the facts in his possession and the testimony furnished by Roscoe C.
