

MUNITIONS MOB ATTACKS POLICE

200 Brooklyn Strikers Are Routed with Revolvers After Fierce Battle.

ONE MAN SHOT; SERGEANT FELLED

Patrol Wagon, Hurrying with Reserves to Aid, Wrecked and Three Men Injured.

With sticks, stones, bricks and beer bottles flying at them, Police Captain James Gillen, flanked by a patrolman and two plainclothes men, defended an unconscious police sergeant from the attack of two hundred munition strikers in South Brooklyn yesterday.

A block away, at Fifty-third Street and First Avenue, fifty detectives guarded a projectile factory belonging to the E. W. Bliss Company, but sent no aid. The factory, which is one of several owned by the company, employs five thousand men.

When they saw one man shot the mob retreated heading up the avenue and side streets.
