

50,000 IN THROG AT ALLIED BAZAAR

Grim Horrors of Battlefield Displayed in Grand Central Palace.

RELICS OF TRENCHES ATTRACT ATTENTION

Exhibits of Shells and Wrecked Planes Vie with Gay Booths of the Nine Allies.

Europe bright and smiling meets France crushed and devastated at the Allied bazaar which opened at the Grand Central Palace last evening.

The gaiety of the crowds which thronged the Palace on the opening night also was very close to the serious purpose for which the bazaar is held.

Fifty Thousand in Gay Throng.

A forecast of the success of the affair is shown by the sale of \$165,000 worth of tickets before the bazaar opened.

The bazaar occupies three floors of the Grand Central Palace. Its booths are divided among many countries, and French, Russian and Italian mingle with English in the requests to purchase this or that.

Taubes in Main Hall.

In the main hall two German taubes swing, peaceful and still, but constant reminders of the conditions which the white wings are marking with great black Maltese crosses—"iron crosses" for the enemy planes they have brought down.

Other notable exhibits are a portion of the Morgan collection of porcelains, paintings by Corolla, Sargent, and many other famous artists.

GIRL DIES IN LAKE OF HEART DISEASE

Miss Hoe, at Training Camp, Did Not Drown, Physicians Find.

HER COMRADES FACE THE CRISIS BRAVELY

Fought Long to Save Young Woman—Soldierlike, They Go on with Daily Routine.

Erskine, N. J., June 3.—The death of Miss Margaret Hoe, one of the thirty young society women in camp here to train for service in time of war, was not due to drowning, but to heart trouble, General E. Z. Steever, in command at the camp, announced this evening.

"Miss Hoe was in water only up to her waist when she sank," General Steever said. "She and five of the other young women had gone to a little lake near the camp to bathe, and were just leaving the water."

First Aid Used at Once.

"She was such an expert swimmer that unless some extraordinary circumstance had arisen she could not have drowned. The physicians who tried to revive her after her body had been found in the shallow water ascertained her heart must have weakened suddenly, causing her to lose control of herself. It is also probable, the doctors say, that she burst a blood vessel in her lungs."
