RUSSIA MOURNS KITCHENER'S LOSS

His Purposed Visit Was to Bring Muscovy in Closer Touch with Allies.

BERLIN SEES NO GAIN IN DEATH OF ENEMY

German Papers Not Disposed to Exaggerate Importance of the Tragedy.

Petrograd, June 7.—Field Marshal Earl Kitchener's death has profoundly affected the whole of Russia.

Russia's remoteness from her allies has prevented that close cooperation which exists between France and Great Britain.

Foreign Minister Sazonov, immediately the news of Earl Kitchener's death was received here, called an expression of sympathy to London on behalf of the imperial government.

Sir George W. Buchanan, British Ambassador, has been the recipient of a constant stream of messages of condolence from Russian officials and men of all ranks and classes.

Berlin, June 7.—The newspapers of Berlin devote much space to-day to Earl Kitchener, whom they generally acknowledge to have been an organizer of the greatest ability.

London, June 7.—All the Dutch papers dwell on the death of Earl Kitchener. The "Nieuwe Courant" sees in it the most formidable blow England has received in this war.

Paris, June 7.—Emile Faguet, well known throughout Europe as an editor and literary critic, died here to-day.

ANTI-AMERICAN RIOT PUT DOWN IN MEXICO

Chihuahua City, Mexico, June 7.—An anti-American riot, incited by a mass meeting to protest against the continued presence of American troops in Mexican territory, was put down here to-night by the military.

DEMONSTRATION MADE AGAINST UNITED STATES CONSULATE

The mob made a demonstration against the American consulate, and hurled stones at the Foreign Club, in the belief that it was an American institution.

London, June 7.—The following British official communication concerning the operations in East Africa was made public this evening:

Brigadier General Northey's columns have pursued the East African Germans to Neu-Utenge, capturing booty and prisoners. The invested Germans broke out of Namema, suffering heavily. The German commandant was made prisoner, wounded. The demoralized natives are welcoming the British, whose losses are small.

SPY CRAZE AGAIN SEIZES ENGLAND

Demand for Internment of Enemy Aliens Result of Kitchener Tragedy.

DEATH IS BELIEVED DUE TO ESPIONAGE

Premier Asquith Temporarily Assumes Office as Secretary for War.

London, June 7.—Earl Kitchener's probable successor and the question as to whether the cruiser Hampshire was hit by a mine or was torpedoed were topics of lively discussion to-day.

Lloyd George is being mentioned in many quarters for Minister for War, while Lord Milner also has some supporters. It is considered extremely unlikely that a soldier will be appointed, as it is thought that Sir William Robertson, chief of the Imperial Staff, has plenty to do without shouldering the civil duties of the Ministry in addition to the military.

ASQUITH IN TEMPORARY CHARGE OF WAR OFFICE

London, June 7.—Premier Asquith has taken temporary charge of the War Office. The British army went into mourning to-day for its late chief.

At the suggestion of the Jockey Club the Windsor race meeting which was to have been held this week has been cancelled on account of Earl Kitchener's death.

Speaking at a luncheon of the British Imperial Council of Commerce to-day, A. J. Balfour, First Lord of the Admiralty, eulogized Earl Kitchener, who he said, to Great Britain's Allies was "the embodiment of the militant forces of the empire."

Paris, June 7.—All officers of the Canadian forces will wear mourning and all flags on militia buildings throughout the Dominion will be at half-mast for one week beginning to-day, in memory of Earl Kitchener.

Paris, June 7.—Emile Faguet, well known throughout Europe as an editor and literary critic, died here to-day.

REICHSTAG VOTES \$3,000,000,000

Amsterdam, June 7.—A Berlin dispatch states that the Reichstag has adopted the budget at all stages and has adopted the new war credit of \$3,000,000,000.

GARBAGE FIGHT DUE SOMEWHERE IN PRALL'S

Carpenters, Guards and Peasants Armed for Battle.

Prospects of an actual battle over possession of a tentative site for the city's proposed garbage reduction plant on the Staten Island shore became bright last night with the announcement of Edward P. Doyle, one of the anti-garbage leaders, that he intends to take possession of Prall's Island to-day and begin the erection of three bungalows for which he has permits.

SUNDAY MAY NOT KEEP DATE HERE

Inability to Get Big Tabernacle Site Cause of His Action.

New York is reported to have started New Year's, 1917, without Billy Sunday. Members of the committee which has been working for months to lay preliminary foundations for a gigantic tabernacle within reach of the city's millions, admitted reluctantly yesterday that the baseball evangelist had requested them to drop the project.

Among the members of the Sunday committee of one hundred there are several well known business men and religious workers who oppose strongly granting the revivalist's request. In view of the fact that Sunday has not made his demand in the form of an ultimatum, it is reported that negotiations are under way to make him change his mind.

"Sunday wants us to call off the campaign," a clergyman member of the committee said. "He knows that we have been unsuccessful in our hunt for a tabernacle site. The New York Central Railroad will not come to terms on renting the large vacant area at Forty-seventh and Forty-eighth streets, between Park and Lexington avenues."

FORT VAUX TAKEN BY CROWN PRINCE

first and second lines from the region of Douaumont to Damoups.

"The Germans announce to-day that Fort Vaux fell into their power on the evening of June 6. On June 7, at 3:50 o'clock in the morning, Fort Vaux was still in our hands. Since that hour, by reason of the violence of the bombardment, it has not been possible to effect any communication with the fort."

"In the Vosges German reconnaissance against our positions south of Apelles were repulsed by our fire."

"There was an intermittent cannonading on the rest of the front."

"German Patrols Dispersed."

"The afternoon statement follows: To the west of Soissons two German patrols which were endeavoring to cross the River Aisne were dispersed at a point near Fontenoy. Our artillery destroyed several observatories of the enemy east of Novvrons."

"In the Argonne district, at La Fille Morte, we caused the explosion with success of three mines. On the left bank of the River Meuse there has been artillery fighting in the sector of Hill 204 and in the sector of the Caurettes Wood."

"On the right bank of the river a strong German attack yesterday evening at about 8 o'clock upon Fort Vaux was broken by the fire of our machine guns. The enemy was driven back in disorder, leaving numerous dead on the field of battle. The German artillery responded with energy, and the bombardment of Fort Vaux and the region immediately surrounding it continued."

"In the Vosges there has been intense bombardment of our first line positions at Hartmannswillerkopf."

British Admit Losses.

The capture of British trenches running through Hooge by the Germans is announced in the British official statement issued this morning. Our artillery belted enemy batteries about Lieving east of Souchez, and about Loos. There has been some mining activity by the enemy northeast of Neuville-St. Vaast and Givenchy."

ITALIANS REPULSE AUSTRIAN ATTACKS

Onslaughts All Along Southern Tyrol Checked, Says Rome.

Rome, June 7.—Checks for the Austrians all along the line of their attack in the Southern Tyrol are reported to-day by the War Office.

"The enemy on Monday evening," says the official statement, "prepared his violent attacks, supported by intense artillery fire, against our positions in the upper valley of the Arsa, on Monte Spiri and along the Campo Mulo Valley, northeast of Asiago. He was everywhere repulsed with very heavy losses. On the heights east of Asiago, our troops were victorious."


