



SLIM CATCHERS REPLACE GIANTS IN BIG LEAGUES Ray Schalk Type of New Backstop—Speed Now Essential.

Fashions change in baseball to a less degree than in dress, and it would seem that the day of the bulky catcher, whose chief asset is his ability to stand up back of the plate and defy a pitcher to knock him down, is past and gone.

When Schalk came up from the Milwaukee club three years ago, he found himself in a lot of trouble. It was only a boy, short in stature, slight in physique, and the crowd howled at one of the greatest catchers in the leagues to-day, and he is perhaps the smallest of all. Indeed, it was Schalk who so completely shattered the idea that in order to succeed a catcher had to be big.

Bill Bariden, first string catcher of the Giants, is another of the true built catchers, now so popular. He is a Boston Braves regular, several years ago, but is only in the last couple of years that he really came into prominence.

Brooklyn is well supplied with big catchers. Chief Meyers, Lewie Carby and Otto Miller round out a trio of big, brawny men. None of them is a fier in any sense of the word.

When Charley Herzog laid down his bat and ceased to guide the reins of the Cincinnati Reds the last day of the playing managers passed from the scene.

The right field wall on the grounds will be the subject of a discussion when the American League meeting is held next winter. It is proposed that a series of marks be placed on the wall to indicate the height of the ball when it is hit.
