## Opening of Racing Season Brings Gay Crowds to Saratoga—Miss Whitney and Miss Carter Are Introduced at Newport.

Saratoga Springs, N. Y., Aug. 5.—With 10,000 people filling the grandstand and overflowing into the clubhouse and the paddock at the Saratoga track, the scene on Monday, when the first race of the season was called, brought joy to the hearts of the officials of the Saratoga Racing Association, for never since this sport has been revived in New York State has there been such a list of thoroughbreds entered for the month of racing. Richard T. Wilson, president of the association, made the announcement several weeks ago that no more stalls were available and that many of the private stables were overflowing.

The first afternoon of racing was followed by a number of dinner parties given at the United States and Grand Union hotels.
