LEE MAGEE GETS BACK INTO GAME

Mackmen Give Way to the Indians To-day—Fisher Also Helps.

By GRANTLAND RICE. The combined art and science of Nick Cullop and Ray Fisher, representing Virginia and Vermont, were required to smash the Athletics' sensational winning streak, which began last Saturday afternoon at 1:30 p. m. and ended Monday at 5:15.

At one spotted moment it looked as if the Mackmen were about to run their daring string out to three games, when catcher Haley shot away a portion of Nick Cullop's knee cap in the fifth.

Even as it was the Yanks escaped by the epidermis of their well known teeth. They scored four runs of Jack Nabors and Jack's bum support before a man was retired in the first.

But from this point on Nabors ruled the show. He allowed but two singles the rest of the distance, and from the first to the seventh inning not a Yankee broke through his guard for a hit.

After that first Yankee charge Nabors retired twenty men in order without a hit, driving the home guard away from the plate with a fine display of what is technically known as "the stuff."

It was a tough break for Nabors, at that. Up to this combat he had won one game and had dropped thirteen. His record now is one vs. fourteen, but over seventy percentage points. They say there is nothing for a tender to work for in late August.

Just Brezced Along. The Giants yesterday dropped to 11½ games back of Brooklyn, and any further debate as to where the new flag pole should be planted will be carried over to next spring.

In the eighth inning as Pipp started to steal Haley attempted to peg on through to second. The ball might have arrived if Pitcher Nabors's wide but thin abdomen hadn't been in the way. As it was, the ball bounded back with a drumlike thump.

Despite all their woe, sorrow, suffering, annoyance, anguish, injuries and two defeats from the Mackmen, the Yanks to-day are but 6½ games from the top.

The Yanks have dropped 16 of their last 19 games, and yet they are mathematically still well up—far enough up for a brief spurt to carry them around the crest.

"Do you think the Browns will win the pennant?" some one asked Cap Huston. "I doubt it," said the Cap. "Why," replied his questioner, "haven't they won 22 out of their last 25 games?" "Suppose they have," answered the Yank owner. "We won 21 out of 24 games back in July, but no one is picking us to win, are they?"

Nick Cullop gets credit for yesterday's battle, as he was leading, 4 to 3, when Fisher relieved him. That makes 11 out of 12 for the Chilhowie south-paw, despite a shattered chest muscle and a battered knee cap. Wonder what percentage Nick would have acquired without his many wounds?

Jack Nabors looked to be a first class pitcher yesterday. He had all the stuff any good pitcher is supposed to have. Yet he won but one out of 15 games. If some expert could get a heart-to-heart interview from Nabors about pitching for the Mackmen it ought to be good for at least six reels.

George Stallings is still absolutely confident his Braves will win the pennant, but as long as his hustling Robins can maintain a four game margin over the Yanks, he will not inhale light nourishment day by day.

The Giants lost four out of 17 starts against the four Western clubs, and the plate on the West coast is still against the Phillies.

Larry Cheney is a has-been the same as Eddie Plank, Russia and Fielder Jones. Pretty tough to see the old boys slip.
