

Salonica's "Hyde Park" Centre of Patriotism

Citizens Gather in Picturesque Spot to Denounce Government's Non-Interference in War—Scenes Resemble Grand Opera, but Nothing Is Gained.

Salonica, Sept. 21.—When one approaches Salonica from the sea the most striking landmark is the famous White Tower, which occupies the centre of the sea front. The miniature park round it is the Bois de Boulogne of Salonica, where "tout Salonique" turns out daily between 5 and 7 for its evening promenade.

But it is also the Hyde Park of the city, for here the citizens hold political meetings and draw up communitarian resolutions denouncing the supine attitude of the Greek government.

In the meantime the Athens government continues its policy of "masterly inactivity," and the Bulgarian invasion goes on. The same spirit is reflected in the local press, which prints editorials which resemble greatly the famous leading article of the "Little Peddington Gazette," which began with the ominous words: "We warn the Emperor of Russia for the third and last time."

Government Unmoved. The Athens government, morning and evening, is threatened with all kinds of terrible puns, but goes on its way unmoved, conducting Greece to the edge of the precipice and preparing with the help of the pro-Germans to jump over it.

The real role of the White Tower is that of the modern Tower of Babel. In its shadow are gathered Albanians, Annamites, French, Italians, Russians, Serbians, Bulgarians, Greeks, and Greeks, in alphabetical order, so as not to arouse international jealousies.

The Salonicians are completely awestruck by the invasion. But it is not the White Tower that one can appreciate it to the full. It is at the Place de la Liberté (the Boulevard des Italiens of Salonica), at the "dépôt d'attente," that the extraordinary forces which compose the "armée d'Orient" are gathered.

The few timid civilians who venture to take seats seem to be apologizing for their existence to the military element. The chairs of the Café Flore and Café Olympus on one side meet those of the Café Belgique and the Café Cristal, opposite, in the middle of the roadway.
