



For hell it is, both physical and moral, if this book be true; and there is only too true there a abundant reason for apprehending. Some errors there doubtless are; perhaps some exaggerations. But it would not be in human nature nor in human power to sustain an exaggeration at such a pitch throughout the entire volume. The narrative is too appalling to be fictitious. Because of its unimaginable frightfulness it must be true. There is, moreover, a convincing mass of cumulative confirmation, both inside and outside the book. For many of the worst things it contains it gives authority by chapter and verse; while the other chapters, taken from extraneous sources. For the book as a whole to be true is perfectly accordant with the known and indisputable truth of parts of it.
