Democratic Chairman Predicts 364 Electoral Votes for Wilson

In a final official forecast of the result of Tuesday's balloting Vance McCormick, chairman of the Democratic National Committee, yesterday claimed all but six states for President Wilson.

McCormick's Figures: The statement follows: "Woodrow Wilson will be re-elected President next Tuesday by a popular plurality and a majority in the Electoral College."

"The New York Herald" to-day publishes the following: "President Wilson leads in 'The New York Herald's' national straw vote. Based upon the straw vote figures, a total of 597 electoral votes would be indicated for the President and 224 for Mr. Hughes."
