

PROHIBITION GAIN PLEASES BRYAN

It Will Be Presidential Campaign Issue in 1920, Commoner Says

Denver, Nov. 10.—"Prohibition is sweeping the country. It will be a Presidential campaign issue in 1920 if a constitutional amendment is not submitted by Congress to the states by that time. The political supremacy of the East, especially New York, is broken. The West can elect a President; it has done so; it can again, and such a condition is mighty good."

These opinions were expressed by William Jennings Bryan here today. A Democratic President has been elected without the aid of New York, he said, and that is something new in American politics. The fact that New York was supposed to be necessary has been a restraining influence on wide progressive legislation in many states.

\$7,000,000 IN BETS HELD BY WALL ST.

Payment Awaits Official Election Announcement; Other Wagers Paid

The millions wagered in the financial district on the outcome of this year's Presidential election will not be paid until it has been officially decided who will occupy the White House after March 4 next. This decision was reached yesterday by the stakeholders on the Broad Street curb market who have handled a large part of the bets placed.

Wagers Aggregate \$7,000,000 Before the close of business last Monday it was estimated that nearly \$6,000,000 had been bet in Wall Street on the election. On Wednesday and Thursday, with the result still in doubt, but with indications of a Wilson victory, approximately another \$1,000,000 was put up by many who wished to reduce their losses by hedging.

4,000 AGAINST WOMEN, SOUTH DAKOTA'S VOTE
