Olympic Champion Runner Bows to F. J. Shea in Philadelphia Games

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 25.—Four records were broken and one equalled in the Middle Atlantic A. A. track and field championships on Franklin Field here today. The Meadowbrook Club won the title for the first time with a score of 96 1/2 points. The Germantown Boys' Club was second with 87 points, and the Pittsburgh A. A. third with 7 points.

F. J. Shea, of the Pittsburgh A. A., shattered the record in the 440-yard dash, running away from Ted Meredith of Meadowbrook, former Penn star, who was beaten for the first time on Franklin Field. Shea's time was 49 seconds. Meredith's former record, which fell, was 50-2-5 seconds.

Howard Barry, the former Penn pentathlon star, carried away another record. He threw the javelin 162 feet 1 1/4 inches, beating the former mark of 146 feet 11 inches, held by J. L. Brechemin.

Barron Takes Hurdles Harold Barron, captain of the State College track team, wearing the Meadowbrook colors, covered the 120-yard high hurdles in 15-5-5 seconds, beating Bob Ferguson, of the Germantown B. C., and lowering his own former record of 16-1-5 seconds.

R. L. Hunter, of the Germantown B. C., made a new mark of 11 feet 10 1/4 inches in the pole vault, beating the record by a quarter of an inch, while Ferdinand Motzky, of the Germantown Boys' Club, won the 100-yard dash in 10-1-5 seconds, equalling the record.


