

Italy Leads in Propaganda To Increase Aid From U. S.

Embassy Here Is Active in Showing Importance of Her Campaign and Its Dependence on America—Allies Competing for Supplies Limited by Shortage in Shipping

WASHINGTON, Sept. 23.—So long as there is a shortage of ships, no matter how great the amount of supplies, some of the nations depending on this country for materials is going to fail to get all it wants. How shall the order of preference be determined? The government has set up several agencies which would solve this problem, if it were left entirely to the Administration to settle it, but at this point enters the official propagandist.

The propaganda is of two sorts—that which comes in over the cables, having been passed by the censors on the other side, and that which is put out by the representatives of the countries in Washington and elsewhere in this country, but principally in Washington. The overseas propaganda is difficult to detect. It is propaganda by selection. The censors give plenty of cable space to correspondents who tell the pressing needs of this or that country, and particularly what is needed to make its military power effective.

Italian Propaganda
There has been some irritation at the extent of the Italian propaganda, but there is no disposition to speak of it. And the Italians have been using their access to publicity very freely. They have put forth "news" describing their needs, the importance of their offensives to the Allied cause, and sometimes even the unimportance of other offensives against Germany.
