Uncle Sam May Kidnap Yale Swimming Coach

Matthew Mann Wanted to Serve as Instructor at Army Camps

GEORGE Schroth, seventeen-year-old high school waterman, of Sacramento, Cal., heralded as a coming champion swimmer.

The swimmers of Yale University have been making determined efforts to secure the services of Matthew Mann, former coach at the New York Athletic Club, now in Duluth, who developed a champion team at New Haven last year, and it was reported a few days ago that he had finally been engaged to handle the varsity squad from January to April.



Came now the news from Duluth that Mann is wanted as an instructor at army camps, and that there is little chance of his being able to carry out the arrangements made. If this proves the case, the Yale watermen will be heavily handicapped, for there are few coaches in the country as competent as Mann, and even less able ones are hard to get these days.

Meanwhile, the Blue's schedule for the title tournament of the Intercollegiate League has been completed, and the following dates are booked: January 11, City College, at New York; 15, Pennsylvania, at New Haven; February 8, City College, at Philadelphia; March 1, Princeton, at New Haven; 5, Columbia, at New Haven; 15, Princeton, at Princeton; 22, Columbia, at New York.

The new clubhouse of the Milwaukee Athletic Club, soon to be ready for occupancy, will have the novelty of two swimming pools—one for men, the other for women. The organization intends to feature water sports for both sexes.

A hitch has occurred in the negotiations set on foot by the swimming team of the Sinal Settlement, of Chicago, to arrange an Eastern competitive tour. Clubs of other cities have learned that the settlement is not affiliated with the A. A. U., and they are now unwilling to go through with plans made for dual meets unless the Windy City organization seeks membership.

Raymond Boyle and Louis Grupp, Pittsburgh's foremost long distance swimmers, are training for a match test of aquatic endurance in which they expect to engage this winter. Boyle, and he expects the new combination to win signal honors this season. His leading candidates are Julia Heaton, Farrell Creighton, Constance Brandt and Leone Richards, swimmer, and Aileen Allen and Grace Burkey, high and fancy divers.

R. Simonson, national collegiate recordist at 440-yard swimming, has returned to Northwestern University and will captain the varsity team.

The Chicago A. C. will have the use of quite a few first class watermen this year, including W. Heyn, H. Rosener, K. Huzar, F. Harless, W. Cox, F. Fickel, B. Corbridge, B. Prineell, H. Gay, F. Sherer and others. H. Spurrier, formerly of Sinal Settlement, will do the coaching.

The championship swimming tournament of the P. S. A. I. enters its last round this week, and the meets on the card are Townsend Harris vs. De Witt Clinton; Stuyvesant vs. Commerce and Boys' High vs. New Utrecht. As, however, the return engagement between Stuyvesant and De Witt was postponed tentatively until December 17, and these two schools appear to be the strongest in the league, no decision is likely to be reached this week.

The swimmers of the University of Pennsylvania will make their season's debut on Friday against C. C. N. Y., and it will be interesting to watch results, for all sorts of conflicting rumors have been afloat regarding the strength of the Quaker City squad.

New York Eleven Wins Soccer Game

New York and Philadelphia yesterday contested their annual intercity soccer match under the worst possible conditions on the grounds of the Staten Island Cricket and Tennis Club. Victory went to New York by the score of 2 goals to 0. The Quakers had had begun in earnest, and although the outlook was very bad, they preferred to have it out yesterday to postponing the game.

The goals were both scored in the first period by Gardner, of Montclair, who played center forward for the metropolitan team. The first was from a pass by Waters, on the right, ten minutes after the start, and the second from a pass by Phillips, at outside left, midway in the first period.

Miss Clara C. Haywood Files Application—Meeting to Be Held To-morrow

George T. Moon, Jr., president of the National Association of Amateur Billiard Players, yesterday received an application for membership from Miss Clara Catherine Haywood, the girl player of Philadelphia. She is desirous of entering one of the national championship tournaments. Her letter follows:

"I enclose please find my application for membership in the National Association of Amateur Billiard Players. In view of the fact that at some future date I may wish to submit my entry for one of the national tournaments, it seemed appropriate to me that I first join the organization. If there is any rule which would be interpreted as excluding women from membership, may I ask you the kind favor of reading this note at the annual meeting of the association?"

"In that event, will you also please request a vote, unanimous if necessary, that would enable me to become a member of your organization, which includes so many of my good friends?"

It was pointed out by Moon that the constitution and bylaws of the National Association of Amateur Billiard Players will be held to-morrow evening at the Liederkranz Club. Several important amendments will be acted upon at this meeting. The plan outlined at the recent session has been arranged by the executive committee, so that sectional associations will be organized in eleven divisions of the country and an additional one to direct amateur billiards in the Dominion of Canada.

It is likely that the place of holding the national championship tournaments in Classes A, B and C at 18.2 ballline will be determined at the annual meeting. The question of permitting practice shots has also been agitated again, and appears likely that it will be incorporated in the rules.

The following nominations have been made for officers of the association and the executive committee: President, George T. Moon, Jr.; vice-president, Corwin Huston; secretary, J. P. Allen, and treasurer, G. O. Rudolph.

The Game Going

Spring Sports At Yale Still Much in Fog

Baseball, Rowing and Track Activities Depend on Possible Call to Colors

NEW HAVEN, Dec. 8.—Definite notice that the members of the Reserve Officers' Training Corps at Yale will be called for active service is expected to prove an important factor in determining plans for the three spring sports—baseball, crew and track. No date has been set for calling the members of the corps to the colors, but it is expected on the campus that the summons will come in February or March.

Last year, as a result of the call, all of the spring athletic teams were left without a single veteran member and no spring competition in athletics took place. The call to service of the members of the present corps will, it is feared, create a condition closely parallel to that of last spring, and the material to organize a varsity baseball team, a crew or a track team may be lacking.

Because of this situation the board of athletic control has taken no action whatever looking toward the organization of spring athletic teams.

During the fall the material for the track and rowing teams has been coached steadily by John Mack and by Professor Mather Abbott, of the faculty, respectively. The rowing season, which closed last week, has resulted in the formation of a promising varsity crew and of a track team, which, although composed of a remarkably small squad, possesses a number of stars.

It was proposed to appoint captains of the three spring teams and allow them to organize the material, but this plan was discarded, as no athletes are allowed in competition at Yale unless they are members of the Reserve Officers' Training Corps, and the call for the corps to report for service therefore is expected to take every athlete out of college. The winter sports probably will complete their programs and schedules before the call for the corps comes.

The only chance that any athletes will remain in Yale is that they will take advantage of the rule which allows him to remain out of service till he is twenty years of age. This did not deter all the varsity athletes of the rowing, baseball and track teams last spring from entering the war.
