

City Spurts, But Falls Back In Loan Race

Second Federal District Drops to Ninth Place in Campaign

\$31,404,250 Total Of Day's Sales Here

New York Guard Parades to Stir Up Interest; St. Louis Leads All

The New York Federal Reserve District yielded still more ground to its rivals throughout the country yesterday in the third Liberty Loan campaign.

Only the consistency with which the Richmond and Atlanta districts are running far behind their quota prevents the Second Federal Reserve District from sinking to the bottom.

The St. Louis district in twelve days subscribed 86 per cent of its official quota, while New York and the rest of this district pledged 41 per cent.

Day's Total Here \$31,404,250 And this latest recession of the 2d Federal Reserve District took place yesterday, although the subscriptions for the twelfth day were the highest announced this week.


Against the pessimism of the New York district was projected the announcement that on the twelfth day of the campaign \$31,404,250 was subscribed.

Moreover, this district is \$348,000,000 behind the schedule necessary to attain the popular goal of \$1,000,000,000.

"Russia Will Come Back," Says Czar's Captor; Aids Loan

Wall Street's Thousands Listen as A. A. Boulikov Makes Plea for Bonds

The voice of Russia or at least a part of it was heard yesterday at the steps of the Sub-Treasury Building. A. A. Boulikov, former member of the Duma and Acting Minister of Ways of Communication during the first days of the revolution of 1917, spoke in behalf of America's third Liberty Loan.

Russia's Heart With Allies "Our country is temporarily out of the ranks. But I may assure you that, in spite of the German 'peace' concluded in the name of Russia by a group of political adventurers, Russia's heart, the heart of the overwhelming majority of the Russian people, is still with you, with the great Allied democracies, and with their just cause.

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Some of the agents were going the rounds of the community yesterday in the guise of Liberty bond salesmen and making careful note of the houses whose occupants were so rapidly Pro-German apparently as to lose all control of themselves at sight of the Liberty Loan insignia.

The sympathies of many of the people in this district do not appear to be with the United States," said Mrs. Van Valer. "Some of my experiences were almost incredible. 
