

2 New York Boys, One 18, Other 19, Killed in France

Three Aviation Officers and Several Guardsmen Are Listed

H. D. Smith Prisoner

Former Broker, Now a Flier, Falls Into the Hands of the Enemy

Two New York boys who were only seventeen years old when they enlisted, are among those named in the casualty list yesterday. Both were killed in action. There were three aviation officers from the vicinity of this city in the list, and men from regular army regiments, the National Guard and the National Army.

Private George P. Eberle, of the headquarters company of the 30th Infantry, who was severely wounded in action, wrote on June 28 to his parents, who live at 1757 Monroe Avenue, the Bronx, that he had been "out on a job" and had been successful. He is twenty-four years old and was drafted last December. He was a civil engineer in the employ of Westinghouse, Church, Kerr & Co., 87 Wall Street.

Private Constantine Pappageorge, of Company M, 328th Infantry, was drowned, according to a message received by Savas Pappageorge, of 60 West Eighth Street, with whom he lived until he was drafted. Pappageorge was twenty-two years old. His mother is living in Athens.

Private John Marra, reported as missing in action, is twenty years old and lived with his sister at 40 Downing Street. Wagoner William O'Connell, of the 165th Infantry, who was named among those severely wounded, was twenty-three years old and lived with his aunt, Mrs. Kate Wallace, at 616 Second Avenue.

Private James Bennett, also reported severely wounded, is a member of Company M, 328th Infantry, a negro regiment. He was wounded on May 28. Private Benjamin Di Loreto, of Yorkers, N. Y., was wounded in the right leg on June 26, according to a letter received by his brother, Giovanni, from a Y. M. C. A. worker in France. Di Loreto was born in Italy twenty-two years ago. He enlisted last September. His parents live in Italy and a brother is in the Italian army.

Private John Arcomano, of Company A, Fourth Infantry, who was killed in action on July 15, was twenty-seven years old when he was drafted last October. His home was at 215 Pearl Street. Corporal Thomas F. Seale, of Company F, 4th Infantry, wrote a letter to his brother, James, with whom he lived at 133 Steiny Avenue, Long Island City, on June 26, four days before he was killed in action. He enlisted on December 10, 1917. His brother, Walter, a member of the 116th Infantry, is at Camp Meade, Md.

Private Carl A. Week, of the Supply Company of the 203d Infantry, who was severely wounded on July 1, is the son of George Week, sexton of St. Bridget's Church, Jersey City. He lived at 63 1/2 Baldwin Avenue, Jersey City, and was drafted on March 4. A brother, L. J. Week, is in France with the 113th Infantry. Private Vincent G. Ferro, of Company I, 327th Infantry, who was severely wounded on July 1, lives at 144 George Street, Brooklyn. He is twenty-three years old. He was drafted in September.

Private Angelo Cantanto, reported missing in action, was also known as Corretto, and boarded for a time at 165 Jefferson Street, Newark, N. J. Later he moved to Arlington, N. J. Lieutenant Herbert D. Smith, of the air service, who was listed as missing in action, is a prisoner in Germany, according to a message which was received yesterday at his parents' home, 229 West Seventy-eighth Street. He is twenty-five years old and was a broker with the firm of Herrick & Bennett, 66 Broadway, when he sailed for France about a year ago. About three weeks ago his family received a letter, in which he said that he had made a flight over the German lines, but had to return because the enemy got his range. First Lieutenant Joseph M. Mellen, of the air service, who also is listed as missing in action, is the son of Chase Mellen, an attorney, of 27 Cedar Street, whose home is in Garden City, Long Island. In 1915, Mellen went to

France to drive an ambulance, and received the Croix de Guerre. Before returning to France he went to Mineola and enlisted in the aviation section. He received his commission in October, 1917, and sailed with the 96th Aero Squadron. He is twenty-four years old.

Lieutenant J. M. Schley, of Lyme, Conn., has received a slight wound in the leg in action, according to a message received by his father, Dr. James M. Schley, of 24 West Fifty-fourth Street. Private George P. The number and quality of the American troops now in France, together with those which are to follow, is a guarantee of final triumph."

Books for U. S. Prisoners Must Come From Publishers
WASHINGTON, Aug. 3.—Books and periodicals can be sent to American prisoners of war in Germany only when they are ordered through the publishers and are dispatched from the offices of publishers, the War Department announced. This ruling by the military censorship was made because old books form a convenient method of secret communication and require extraordinary scrutiny by the censorship force.


