

Schoeneck to Be Opposed By Heacock

Former Senator Will Run for Lieutenant Governor

Makes Fight as A "Patriotic Duty"

Promises to Give Further Reasons for His Action

ALBANY, Aug. 6.—Former Senator Seth G. Heacock, of Iliac, Herkimer County, died a designating petition this afternoon for the Republican nomination for Lieutenant Governor. The petition bore 5,500 names.

Mr. Heacock's backers, it was learned, are hoping to cut into the vote of Lieutenant Governor Edward Schoeneck, who is seeking re-nomination on the Whitman ticket. Mr. Schoeneck has been the object recently of bitter attacks because of his very active defense of his law clerk, who was charged with being pro-German.

The principal candidates seeking nominations for state offices in the September 3 primaries filed their petitions late to-night. Aside from the petition of former Senator Heacock, there were no surprises.

Mr. Heacock has been active in politics for many years. He is a graduate of Hamilton College and in 1895 was a candidate for the Republican nomination for Congress and was defeated by a narrow margin.

In his public announcement, made yesterday, that he was a candidate for Lieutenant Governor, Mr. Heacock said:

Whitman for Third Term

W. W. Cocks, chairman of the Whitman Campaign Committee, said yesterday in the Murray Hill Hotel that thirty-five counties had indorsed Governor Whitman for reelection, and that of the remaining twenty-six counties twenty of them were "safe" for the Governor.

"We anticipate serious opposition to the Whitman ticket only in the counties of Albany, Westchester, Ulster, Greene, Saratoga, Livingston, Kings and Broome," said Chairman Cocks.

The Whitman men count on "break-even" with Lewis in Kings and Westchester, while Onondaga County has not officially indorsed Whitman. Francis Hendricks heads the Whitman petitions, and the Whitman people predict a sweep there for the Governor. The counties which have indorsed the Governor are Allegheny, Cayuga, Chautauque, Chemung, Clinton, Cortland, Cattaraugus, Dutchess, Erie, Essex, Franklin, Herkimer, Fulton and Hamilton (one Assembly district), Lewis, Monroe, Montgomery, Nassau, New York, Ontario, Oneida, Otsego, Putnam, Rensselaer, Richmond, Rockland, St. Lawrence, Schoenectady, Schenectady, Seneca, Sullivan, Tompkins, Warren, Yates.

The counties that the Whitman men classify as "safe" for the Governor are Bronx, Delaware, Fulton, Genesee, Jefferson, Madison, Niagara, Orange, Orleans, Oswego, Queens, Schuyler, Steuben, Suffolk, Tioga, Warren and Wyoming.

Albany and Westchester counties have indorsed Attorney General Lewis. The Broome County organization is controlled by the Hinman Welsh men, favorable to Lewis, but Senator Hill, who is running for Congress in the Binghamton district, says that the Governor will carry the county in the primaries. In Kings County the Whitman men count on carrying fourteen of the twenty-one Assembly districts.
