

Congress to Take Up Draft Bill To-day

House and Senate Expected to Pass Measure Within a Few Days

Amendment Would Call Minors Last

Controversy Over 'Work or Fight' Clause Looked for in Debate

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.—Congress is prepared to turn its attention exclusively to-morrow to the man-power bill, extending the draft age limits to all Americans eighteen to forty-five years of age, to provide the army counted upon to defeat Germany next year.

Debate on the measure will begin simultaneously to-morrow in the Senate and House, with the passage expected in the House before adjournment and by the Senate within a few days.

Exclusive right of way was given by the House to-day to the measure which was reported by the Military Committee with the amendment to defer calling youths of eighteen and nineteen years of age until all those of twenty and over are summoned.

The Senate has set aside its three-day recess programme for the special purpose of taking up the bill. The first business session of the Senate will be held to-morrow and Chairman Chamberlain of the Military Committee to-night anticipated no difficulty in securing the bill's immediate and exclusive consideration.

To Lay Aside 'Dry' Bill If not passed before next Monday, when the national prohibition measure would become privileged, the bill probably will be held before the Senate until passed, prohibition leaders having agreed to lay their measure aside temporarily.

Passage of the bill by an overwhelming vote in both houses, with the age limits of eighteen and forty-five unchanged, is deemed certain in all quarters. The only serious controversy expected are over the "work or fight" amendment of the Senate Military Committee and the House committee's amendment postponing service for boys of eighteen and nineteen.

Opponents of the latter amendment, to which Administration spokesmen have made strong objections, to-night predicted it would be stricken out and the President left with authority proposed in the Administration draft to fix the order of calling all classes.

For the "work or fight" legislation, opposed by organized labor, Chairman Chamberlain and Senator Thomas, of Colorado, its author, are prepared to make a vigorous fight, with its disposition in doubt.

Would Commission Minors Another amendment by Chairman Dent added to the bill provides that the fact that a soldier has not reached twenty-one shall not bar him from a commission.

Plans for the organization of a student army training corps to train men as officers and technical experts for the army in the educational institutions of the country were approved to-day by the General March, chief of staff, at the direction of Secretary Baker.

The plants, equipment and organization of colleges now cooperating with the War Department will be utilized to maintain a reservoir of officer material in training, from which it will be possible to meet the enlarged needs of the various branches of the army. The plans were altered to conform to the plans of the War Department for lowering the draft age.

English Labor Party Urges Peace Meeting

Manifesto to Working Men's Leaders Proposes Conference to End War

LONDON, Aug. 21.—The Independent Labor party to-day issued a manifesto urging the British labor leaders to reunite and to assemble in international conference. International Socialism and labor, the manifesto says, possess the means of initiating a settlement of the war by negotiation.

The manifesto adds that the only large body of labor in opposition is the American Federation of Labor, "which possesses no political mandate, while the American Socialist party cordially approves" the holding of a conference.

The manifesto declares that had the Stockholm conference been held as originally proposed the warring governments might long since have been forced to open negotiations and the war might now have been ended and the world united in a league of nations.

Bretton Woods Has Searchlight Scare

Flashes From Mt. Washington Lead to Spy Suspicions and Arrests

(Special Dispatch to The Tribune) BRETTON WOODS, N. H., Aug. 21.—The flashing of several nights of a powerful searchlight located high on the side of Mount Washington, near here, resulted about midnight last night in the arrest of the operator, Robert L. Smith, of Boston; his wife and another woman who accompanied them.

When arrested by a deputy sheriff from Gorham, N. H., and a posse of about fifty men Smith protested that there was nothing reprehensible about his actions. He said he was president of the New Portable Electric Searchlight Company, of Boston, and that he had come to Mount Washington to try out his invention.




The searchlight he was using was said to be sufficiently powerful to throw signals more than 300 miles. Smith said he had telephoned a friend in Portland to watch for his signaling. A friend of Smith who was staying at Randolph, N. H., was taken into custody, and both will be taken to Portsmouth for examination.

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The Casualty List

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.—There are 358 names on the army casualty list made public here to-day, and 15 on the Marine Corps list. Forty-five men were killed in action in the army; 128 were wounded severely; 129 are missing in action; 17 died of wounds or from other causes; 38 are suffering from wounds the degree of which is undetermined, and one man is a prisoner.

Of the marines, five were killed in action, one died of wounds received in action, three were wounded severely, and three were wounded to a degree still undetermined.
