

Armistice Speeds Insurance Plans For War Veterans

All Men With Policies to Get Chance to Change to Peace System

Women Eligible, Too Members of Nurse Corps to Have Same Rights as Soldiers and Sailors

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—Preparations by the government for reinsuring the lives of soldiers and sailors on their return have been hastened by the signing of the armistice. It is certain that of the 4,250,000 men in the military or naval service now holding voluntary government insurance will be permitted within five years after peace to convert it without further medical examination into ordinary life, twenty-payment life or life maturing at the age of sixty-two, or other prescribed forms. This insurance will be arranged by the government, not by private companies. The cost is expected to be at least one-fourth less than similar forms offered by private agencies, because the government will pay all overhead expenses, which for private companies is 17 per cent of premium receipts; will save solicitation fees and bear the risk resulting from wounding or disabling of men while in service. The government will arrange to collect premiums monthly or for longer periods in advance. This may be done through post offices. The minimum insurance to be issued probably will be \$1,000 and the maximum \$10,000, with amounts between those sums in multiple. There will be provision for payments in case of disability as well as death, according to the tentative plan. The insurance may be purchased by any soldier, sailor or marine and by women members of the army or navy nurse corps if they already hold government voluntary life insurance. About 95 per cent of the 4,500,000 men in the service are covered by this insurance, which expires after they go back to civilian life and cease paying premiums. This is the system devised to replace the old pension plan. Thus will be created the government's emergency war insurance budget, the greatest life insurance institution in the world for peace times. Out of the experience gained may eventually develop expansion of government insurance to old age, to industrial and other forms of insurance. Regulations for reinsuring returning soldiers and sailors are being framed by an advisory board, consisting of Arthur Hunter, actuary of the New York Life Insurance Company; W. A. Fraser, of Omaha, of the Woodmen of the World, and F. Robertson Jones, of the women's compensation publicity bureau, of New York.

Plans also are under consideration for allowing beneficiaries of men who have died or been killed in the service to choose between taking monthly payments over a period of twenty years or to commute these payments in a lump sum.

## Princeton Leader Dies in Action at Head of His Men

Lieut. Benjamin Bullock, 3d, Was Editor of College Daily in 1916

## Two Other Heroes Fall

Lieut. Clifford West Henry, Harvard Man, and Private "Tommy" Purtell Killed

Lieutenant Benjamin Bullock, 3d, of the 315th Infantry, was killed September 29 while leading his troops in action. He was buried in the village of Nantillois, which his men took soon after he fell. He was the only son of Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin Bullock, of Ardmore, Penn., and was graduated from Princeton in 1916. During his senior year he was editor of "The Daily Princetonian." He was employed by the Curtis Publishing Company and was a member of the 1st City Troop of Philadelphia before going to the officers' training camp at Fort Niagara.


Lieutenant Clifford West Henry, of the 102d Infantry, was mortally wounded leading a company against machine gunners in the St. Mihiel attack September 14. He died October 16. His men had marched ninety miles to get into the St. Mihiel battle. When they arrived they had to go in with inadequate artillery support, their guns being bogged in the rear. When the captain of his company fell, Lieutenant Henry rallied the men and went on.

Private Thomas Brien Purtell, of the 6th Machine Gun Battalion, Marine Corps, who fought through Chateau Thierry and Belleau Wood and carried his mandolin everywhere his pack went, was killed in action October 6. The tinkle of "Tommy" Purtell's mandolin had smoothed the way of many restless hours for his comrades. He was twenty-eight years old and lived with his mother and two aunts at 200 West Ninety-ninth Street. An aunt and an uncle live in San Francisco. "The blow is great," said his mother on learning of his death, "but the cause is greater."

Private Amherst W. Meeker, of Company I, 107th Infantry, who died from wounds September 30, was the son of Samuel M. Meeker, of 1365 Dean Street, Brooklyn, vice-president of the Williamsburg Trust Company. The young man joined an ambulance unit in his junior year at Williams College. When in training he obtained a transfer to the 107th Infantry. He was twenty-two years old.

## Two Americans Escape From German War Camps

THIEST, Nov. 11 (By The Associated Press)—Aviator Coymung, of Des Moines, Iowa, who was supposed to have been killed, has arrived here with a number of Allied prisoners who succeeded in escaping from Austrian concentration camps owing to local riots.
