Wayward Youths Trained for Duty With Government

Extensive Work of Preparation Done by Children's Aid Society

Five Trustees Elected William Church Osborn Is Made President—Year's Activities Outlined

In the last year, the Children's Aid Society has done extensive work in preparing wayward boys for government service, in giving aid to New York's needy and in providing vacations for undernourished children.

Five trustees of the society were elected for four years as follows: Thomas W. Lamont, William Church Osborn, Arthur Curtis James, William H. Wheelock and Eugene H. Pool.

During the year 314 orphans and deserted children were placed in family homes; 378 runaways returned to their parents; 9,092 children taught in industrial schools; 7,746 anemic children benefited by the Fresh Air Fund; 2,504 boys and girls sheltered in lodging houses; and 469 homeless mothers and babies sheltered.

From our new boys' lodging home 2,500 young men have enlisted since the European war began, and from among our former wards who were placed in families in the West and South more than 700 enlisted.

The Children's Aid Society has been carrying on its work in the home to discover what effect proper living conditions, food and individual attention would have upon such children.

Happy vacations of two weeks were given at our Goodhue Home on Staten Island to 934 children. A camp for one hundred boys was established, and during the summer 74 boys were given all the pleasures of camp life.

A feature of the celebration will be a tableau of the Allies. Part of the Garden will represent a naval training camp, and in this setting 400 sailors will sing navy songs.

World's First Woman Diplomat Opens Embassy in Swiss Hotel

Mme. Rosika Schwimmer, Representing Hungary, Says She Debated Question Four Days Before Accepting Post; Later Will Give It to a Man

BERNE, Nov. 25. (By The Associated Press.)—Mme. Rosika Schwimmer, of Ford peace party fame, who has accepted the post of Hungarian Minister to Switzerland, being the first woman to receive such an appointment, declared to the correspondent to-day she had debated the question four days before accepting this mission.

Her natural inclination as a feminist urged an immediate acceptance, but, she said, the situation was so grave she questioned herself at length as to whether her appointment would embarrass the Swiss authorities.

Found No Opposition When she found there was no apparent opposition, she accepted, with the provision that she could return to Hungary and enter Parliament as soon as the situation was more normal and a suitable man could be selected to succeed her.

The first woman diplomat has taken quarters in a well known hotel in Berne and has transformed one room into an office.

The food needs of Hungary, she said, were "nowhere near urgent." There is danger owing to the lack of coal, she added. Difficulties in the northern and southern sections of the old Austro-Hungarian Empire have prevented Hungary from getting its full amount of coal.

The situation in Hungary is such, Mme. Schwimmer continued, that the government would be willing to abide by any decision of a peace conference, "no matter how unfavorable," because the government is helpless.

Hungarians, both extremists and reactionaries, she says, have joined efforts to create an orderly and democratic government. Hungary has given up Croatia, Fiume and other districts because she recognized they belonged elsewhere.

Perfect order has prevailed in Hungary up to this time, but there is increasing danger from the troops returning from the battlefield.

Credited with being the originator of the Ford peace plan, Mme. Schwimmer also was reported to have caused most of the dissension in the party by her arbitrary methods of directing affairs.
