

Palm Beach Goats Bleat in Sorrow as Hylan's Stay Wanes

Mayor's Daily Communique Deals With the 'Interests,' the 'Common People' and His Honor's Good Nature

PALM BEACH, Fla., Feb. 28.—The goats of Palm Beach are bleating mournfully to-night and refuse to be comforted. And the jellyfish that patrol the beach where Hearn and Hylan have been wont to walk to gether have lost their appetites for food, now that their enraptured chronicler is so soon to leave them.

For John F. Hylan, sage of Palm Beach, and, between vacations, Mayor of New York City, is going home tomorrow. The grief that the goats and jellyfish feel in losing their little playmate is nothing, take it from the Mayor, to the dolor that is about to overcome the "interests" in Manhattan and adjacent boroughs.

Tackles Divers Topics The official communique on the thoughts and works of Mayor Hylan, issued daily by his honor, dealt today with the Mayor's health, the Mayor's portrait, the Mayor's generous nature, the "interests," the common people and the league of nations. It follows:

HIS HEALTH—"You might state that I am returning much benefited in health, vigorous and eager to get to my work again."

HIS PORTRAIT—"It is my understanding that the portraits of Mayors are placed in the City Hall only after they are dead. I did not tell my secretary to stop Miss S. W. Hunter making subscriptions for a picture, but any one who knows me knows enough to do so without being told. Everybody should know by this time that I never accept presents."

HIS GENEROUS NATURE—"Certain of the New York papers have tried to pester me for coming down here. I never have never bothers me. I know they do it because I am a friend of the people. In sticking to my people, I am only carrying out my natural impulses. From the time I was a boy, it was always natural for me to look out for others and not to think of myself, and the habit has stuck to me through life."

Not Fooled by "Interests"—I have been approached a good many times by kind people who wanted to do something for me since I went to the City Hall, but I know they represent the interests and I make a business of never having anything to do with them."

THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS—"I can only say that the subject is so vast and many sided, I would have to give a great deal of study before expressing an opinion. I have always felt that we should not involve ourselves in foreign quarrels. I can only say in a general way that what I think is not the question. It is what the people want that counts."

Women's League for Equal Opportunity Called Camouflage

James Lynch, Industrial Commission Head, Says It Masks Group That Seeks to Exploit Girl Workers

Charges that the "Women's League for Equal Opportunity," which has been opposing the woman's legislative programme in this state, is a cloak for the activities of forces "that are trying to debase and degrade and exploit womanhood for dollars," was made yesterday by James Lynch, head of the Department of Investigation of the New York State Industrial Commission.

"The unscrupulous men who fatten on the exploitation of women workers are hiding behind the skirts of a few women calling themselves the Women's League for Equal Opportunity," said Mr. Lynch. "This league opposes the bills which provide for an eight-hour day, a minimum wage for women, protection for women elevator, transportation for office workers and for health insurance."

"The Women's Joint Legislative Conference is composed of the Women's Trade Union League, representing 75,000 workers; the Y. W. C. A. of the New York State; the Consumers' League of the city and state and the National League of Women Workers. It is backed by the State Federation of Women's Clubs and represents the united womanhood of the state. Opposing the conference bills are all the forces that are trying to debase and degrade and exploit womanhood for dollars, camouflaged by this Women's League for Equal Opportunity."

The protest of the few women already in protected positions, who are willing to sacrifice the interests of the million other working women of the state, in order to continue their own slight work is of little moment, as every girl, no matter how good, injures a few.

"Copies of the resolution were mailed to the legislators, so that they would know working men and women who are united in supporting the women's programme and will fight to the last ditch those who oppose it."

Another Woman Suffrage Amendment Before Senate

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—Another Federal woman suffrage amendment was introduced in the Senate today by Senator Jones, of New Mexico.

The amendment, which was introduced in the Senate today by Senator Jones, of New Mexico, is identical with the fourth amendment on suffrage introduced since the "Susan B. Anthony" amendment failed to pass February 10.

The new version of the suffrage amendment stands for practically the same things as the "Susan B. Anthony" amendment. Its wording is more drastic, and, it is said, admits at least one Southern Democrat to vote, without qualms as to the rights of states.

The amendment introduced by Senator Jones today is conceded to have several faults in the eyes of the women who are for woman suffrage. The vote of Senator Gay, of Louisiana, is the one that suffragists believe they have won through the change.

Provençal Pastoral Performed in New York for First Time in Years

Once upon a time "Faust" and "Roméo et Juliette" were the most popular operas in the Metropolitan company's list. To one or the other had to fall the honor of opening the season or fashionable society was not satisfied. After a space, in which M. Jean de Reszke and some of his tuncful companions had educated the public to an appreciation of a different order of dramatic song, Olympian Grand launched a thunderbolt by producing "Tristan and Isolde" on a first night; but the foundations of society were not shaken, riven or destroyed. Thereafter "Fidelio" and "Faust," "Tannhäuser" and "Tristan," "Trovatore" and "Tosca," "Don Giovanni" and "Don Pasquale," "Meistersinger" and "Magic Flute," "Barber" and "Bohème," "Lohengrin" and "Lucia," "Rheingold" and "Roméo," "Pagliacci" and "Prophète," Beethoven and Bizet, Mozart, Meyerbeer, Massenet and Mascagni, "Knut with the Graces" and the "Houris in Dance," led on the opera to the heights of popular delight.

Of late "Faust" has been restored to us with pretty adornments, and last night the lovers of Gounod's art were offered a substitute for "Roméo et Juliette" in the form of "Mireille," which on this occasion received its first representation in New York in the language in which it was written, to wit, in the original Provençal.

The opera was heard here in 1914, but it is not the same "Mireille" as Miss Emma Nevada, who had just joined Colonel Mapleson's forces at the Academy of Music, sang with Madame Sisti, Signor De Anna and Signor Chianelli, in the Academy of Music in Brooklyn on December 18 of that year and two days later at the last matinee of the subscription season at the Academy of Music.
