

**League Assailed
As Super-State
By Wadsworth**

**No Pact Should Control
Citizenship of America,
He Tells Presbyterians**

**Revision of Draft Urged
Nation Advised Carefully
to Consider Before For-
saking Monroe Doctrine**

United States Senator James W. Wadsworth, jr., last night attacked the proposed constitution of the league of nations at the Jamaica Presbyterian Church when he declared that "surely we can do better than this, surely from the peace conference can come a better solution."

Senator Wadsworth argued the delegates could draw up an international code which could "provide clearly and succinctly for compulsory arbitration," and then, he added, "have your league of nations to enforce this code."

The provisions governing the powers of the executive council of the proposed league were the chief targets of Mr. Wadsworth's attacks. He called the executive council "the head and front of a super-state." He asserted there were no rules or methods of organization for the executive council, which he called an "astounding omission," and he exclaimed: "I ask in all frankness isn't it surprising that the members of the Senate insist that these omissions be repaired? It can't have life breathed into it unless the Senate give consent."

Aliens Called United States Problem
Asserting it was admitted that the problem of immigration could be brought before the executive council, Senator Wadsworth said: "I deny the jurisdiction. The people of America can never afford to convey to any one outside of America jurisdiction to say who shall be admitted to the citizenship of the United States. We've got to be left absolutely alone in the settlement of this problem."

The speaker also singled out Article 10, which relates to safeguarding the territorial integrity and political independence of the members of the league. He took issue with Oscar S. Straus, who said the obligation to furnish arms and money for that safeguarding was not contractual but moral.

"If it is a moral obligation," Senator Wadsworth said, "we've got to respond. When America is called upon she must do it. Unless we live up to the spirit of it it becomes a contemptible scrap of paper."

Possibilities Suggested
Mr. Wadsworth pictured the league in existence and growing to include thirty or forty members. Then he declared restlessness is characteristic of the age, and "is asking too much of human nature to restrict these nations for all time under a contract of this sort." He said that with the league effective and should America go to war for Cuba's sake, as she did in 1898, these forty nations would attack the United States for striking at the territorial integrity of Spain.

Speaking of Washington's Farewell Address, Senator Wadsworth said "not that it is final for all time, but that it serves as a reminder to us to abandon the Monroe Doctrine we ought to consider. Let's not depart from it in a few weeks and embark upon a road which leads no man know whither," he advised.

**Bill Proposes Pension
For All City Employees**

**Will Take Care of All Who Are
Not Protected by Some
Other Fund**

ALBANY, March 14.—A bill introduced to-day by Senator John J. Boylan, Democrat, of New York, creates a general retirement system for New York City employees not protected by other pension funds. The bill is approved by Joseph Haag, secretary of the Board of Estimate, and is believed to have the backing of the city administration.

Under it is incorporated the "New York City employees retirement system." It is to include employees in the city service for every class who renounce all claims to benefits from other retirement funds backed by the city. Five funds are created and the Board of Estimate is the trustee of all. These funds are to be in the custody of the City Comptroller, subject to supervision of the State Insurance Department.

City employees are divided in three groups, laborers, mechanics and skilled workers and clerks, administration and technical workers. The minimum retirement age of the three groups are respectively, fifty-eight, fifty-nine and sixty.

Assemblyman Morris Bloch, Democrat, of New York, introduced a bill, providing for the licensing of hotels, boarding, lodging and furnished room houses, tenement or apartment houses, in New York City. The fee to be \$10 a year for each place containing more than five rooms, offered for rental. Each license must have the written approval of the Police Commissioner.

**'Citizen' Creel to
Devote Future to
'Delousing' Nation**

**Wilson's Censor Ready to
Quit Job and Announces
Plan to Enter Politics;
Does Not Seek Payroll**

WASHINGTON, March 14.—Settlement of the accounts of the Committee on Public Information, now being made, will show that the committee's domestic work was "virtually self-sustaining," George Creel, chairman of the committee, said to-day. Mr. Creel returned several days ago from Europe. He reiterated to-day that he had resigned as chairman of the committee. President Wilson, he said, however, had not yet accepted his formal resignation.

In explaining that he regarded himself now as a private citizen, Mr. Creel said that he had made no plans for his future activities, but meant to take an active interest in political affairs. He added that it would not be as an office seeker, "but much as an humble assistant in the delousing process of which our public life stands in need."

Creel characterized reports of differences with President Wilson as "so false as to be absurd." He said that, on the other hand, it was his greatest pride that he could say that from the first to the last he "had only faith, confidence and the most inspiring support from the President."

In discussing the peace conference Mr. Creel asserted that he kept his pledge made before going abroad that he would have nothing to do with the conference or its publicity.

"The amazing situation developed," he added, "that the very correspondents who were most fearful of 'my secret control' were eventually quarrelling with me for my steadfast refusal to act as their 'wire man'."

The committee chairman denied flatly that the American government had, since the opening of the peace conference, exercised any censorship over news matter between Europe and the United States.

**Palmer Would End
War by 'Any League'**

**Nothing Will Maintain Peace if
Peoples Are Bred in
Fight, Ho Says**

"I am for a league of nations—any league of nations, any formula which will be a start in ending war," said Frederick Palmer last night, in an address at the City Club. "But no league of any kind, nothing the lawyers can devise, will end war unless we put violence out of our hearts and learn international good will, which begins by putting yourself in your neighbor's place, whatever language he speaks. Violence breeds war—and opinions seem pretty violent at the conference, and even more violent at home. Disarmament will not end war. Peace is only a relative term. If one side has pitchforks and the other has not it is relatively prepared, and when leaders have bred the people into fighting rage they will fight—even if they have to give three months' notice—and that again proves the need of international good will and a curb on international suspicion and prejudice."






