

The War Department's committee on education and special training maintains that a certain programme of physical instruction is necessary for the Reserve Officers' Training Corps.

Cornell Optimistic About Prospects For Track Team

ITHACA, N. Y., April 5.—The outlook for the development of another strong track team at Cornell this year, a team that should, with the exception of the weight events and high jump, be considerably stronger than last year, was materially improved at the opening of the spring term with the return to the university of Ivan C. Dresser, two-miler; John Watt, hurdler, and F. S. Abreu, half-miler.

In 1918 Dresser was the fastest of all college distance runners. He won the two-mile race at the intercollegiate on Franklin Field, and in the dual meet between M. I. T. and Cornell he covered the two-mile course in 9 minutes 22 1/2 seconds, faster than the intercollegiate record and within less than five seconds of the American record set by Ted Berna.

New York A. C. Runner Responds to Good Coaching and Develops Into Winner

The surprising reversal of form shown by Jack R. Sellers, the New York Athletic Club athlete, during the past month has caused considerable credit among the metropolitan athletes.

One expert contends that Sellers has finally corrected his main fault of falling in three years during his races, which fault was particularly evident before his sudden leap into fame.

The national senior indoor championships of last year will always be indelibly printed on Sellers's mind, for it was in these games at the 13th Regiment Army that he gave the impression that he was the sort of middle distance runner his friends had claimed him to be.

Three athletes, Jimmy O'Brien, Jack Sellers and Neal Shagnessy, have been selected to represent the Metropolitan Association 'cross-country committees as meet to-morrow night with the object of selecting dates for this year's contest.

Distance runners of the local district are requested to send in their entries for the Easter Sunday handicap run of the Metropolitan Athletic Association. No fewer than twenty-five prizes are to be awarded, and among the starters already named are Max Bohland, Charles Kaufman, Charles Pores and Oswald Larsen.
