

more interested in the hearing than the State Controller. "I am willing to answer all questions," said Mr. Burns, "but I object to such questions as are asked for the purpose of placing upon the records information as to our methods which our competitors have for years been trying to find out, so that they may know how we do our work."

Mr. Burns denied, in answer to a question by Mr. Steinbrink, that he lends the name of his agency to owners of protective devices for banks and other concerns, "that we do permit them," he added, "to state and advertise that our agency will run down any employee or other person who commits a crime, like raising a check which has been protected by a device which we approve as being good."

Mr. Steinbrink asked about the Burns agency employing ex-convicts and other men whose characters are not first investigated.

"We do sometimes employ what are known as 'yeggmen,'" said Mr. Burns, "for the purpose of getting information which they are particularly able to obtain, but we never credit their reports until our own men have proved them up."

"I have never permitted my employees to tap a wire or place a telephone in a labor meeting, nor have I offered employees my men so they could become delegates to labor organizations and report upon their doings."

The hearing was adjourned to Tuesday.

"The Tribune has cooperated splendidly," he said, "with Federal authorities, with the District Attorney and with merchants themselves in ridding the city of the menace of the false advertising and the fraudulent business man."
