

Columbia Eight Wins Oarsmen of New York A. C. Are Second in Close Race

New Rochelle High School Crew, Which Finishes Fifth, Wins Applause of Spectators Who Line Banks of Harlem; Sobotka Wins Singles

By A. C. Cavagnaro Columbia University captured the junior eight-oared shell race in the annual regatta of the New York Rowing Association, held on the Harlem River yesterday.

The contest was the most determinedly fought of the entire programme of nine events and also resulted in the largest entry going to the starting point. It was a gruelling struggle and not until half of the journey had been covered did the five boats break the alignment that prevailed from the starting point.

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The Columbia crew was the quicker, while the New York "pull" was long and carried much power. At the three-quarter point Columbia had pulled away to a three-quarter boat-length lead and at this point the athletic club men called on their reserve crew.

The New York oarsmen rapidly closed the gap between them and the collegians, and a hundred yards from the finish were trailing by only a few feet. Realizing the danger the Columbia men then rose to the occasion.

But the N. Y. A. C. crew proved it was still to be considered as it increased its speed. Columbia did not lack its fast gear, but in spite of this the club men managed to cut out Columbia's lead and to lengthen it.

The Union Boat Club, which was trailed more than five lengths in the rear while the Atalanta Boat Club was fourth and New Rochelle High School fifth.

While the latter youngsters were outclassed, their enthusiasm and grit won much applause on the crowd.

Wide margins separated the crews at the finish in the other eight races. Only one exception was in the junior eight-oared shell race, the opening double scull race, when the competing boats were responsible for a hair-raising finish.

At the three-quarter point the New Rochelle and Nonpareil crews were racing along together when the first med boat began to swamp from shipping water from the start.

As a walkaway for Frank Sobotka, the best Bohemian crew, who finished his three rivals in commanding fashion.

Large Crowd Watches Jack Punch the Bag

TOLEDO, Ohio, May 30.—There will be four preliminaries to the world's heavyweight championship contest between Jess Willard and Jack Dempsey here July 4, A. Q. Thatcher, matchmaker of the Toledo Athletic Club, announced to-night.

The huge arena, with a seating capacity of 50,000 persons, will be opened to the public at 9 o'clock in the morning, and the first preliminary contest will be started at 11 o'clock.

Dempsey entertained a capacity Memorial Day crowd in his sun-baked arena on the shores of Maumee Bay this afternoon. There were more women visitors in camp than men.

The day was blistering hot, but Manager Jack Kearns decided to have Dempsey do his boxing in the heat of mid-afternoon instead of the cool of the morning, so that he will become accustomed to conditions likely to prevail on Independence Day afternoon.

Dempsey's work with the gloves was cut down for him, but his roadwork was increased in an effort to sharpen his mind. He covered ten miles this morning and, after a rest, went swimming.

Max Bohland, the national cross-country champion, had only four seconds to spare in winning the fast time prize in the five mile road run that featured the games of the St. Mary's Holy Name Society on Parker Field, Plainfield, N. J., yesterday.
