

41 More Deaths in A. E. F. Reported By Gen. Pershing

Total Casualties for Army Abroad Reaches Total of 285,552; Disease Fatal to 17 Men in France

WASHINGTON, June 7.—General Pershing's daily report of casualties in the American expeditionary forces today added 440 names to the total, which is now 285,552.

Army Casualties to Date Reported June 7. Total. Killed in action (including 381 at sea) 5 33,222. Died of wounds 2 13,514. Died from accident and other causes 17 4,671. Died of disease 17 23,241. Wounded in action (over 85 per cent returned) 392 207,362. Missing in action (including 170 prisoners released and returned) 7 2,092. Total 440 285,552. Today's list was divided as follows: Killed in action, 5; died from wounds, 2; died of accident and other causes, 17; died of disease, 17; wounded severely, 78; wounded (degree undetermined), 75; wounded slightly, 239; missing in action, 7; total, 440.

Flames Kill Tanker Fireman

Fire on Shipping Board's Oil Carrier Put Out by Transport

Radio messages yesterday at the local office of the United States Shipping Board from the transport Westhaven announced that the board's 10,000-ton oil carrier Beechleaf had been on fire, that a fireman had been burned to death and the third engineer seriously hurt.

The master of the Westhaven said the fire had been extinguished and that he had taken the vessel in tow. Her machinery and rudder had become deranged and she was unable to keep on her course. The Westhaven picked the tanker up about 110 miles east of Sandy Hook and expected to bring her to an anchorage in the lower bay this morning.

The Beechleaf left Baton Rouge May 23 with oil for England. She last reported by wireless in Thursday, when 200 miles east of the Ambrose Channel Lightship.

NEW YORK, June 7.—High pressure was showers and thunderstorms in the lake region, the Ohio Valley, the middle Atlantic States, New England, Florida, West Arkansas, Oklahoma and Wyoming, while over the remainder of the country the weather was fair.

Man Who Promoted Rangeburnett to Give Facts to Jury

Newman Says He Waives Immunity in Probe of Fake Oil Stock; Broker's Office in Wall Street Is Raided

Paul A. Newman, of Paul A. Newman & Co., of 15 Broad Street, the broker who has been active in promoting stock of the Rangeburnett Oil Company, announced yesterday afternoon, following another voluntary visit to the office of Assistant District Attorney Dooling, that on Monday he would go before the Grand Jury, investigating oil stock swindles, and, waiving immunity, would tell about his relations with Rangeburnett stock.

"I shall lay all the facts before the Grand Jury," declared Mr. Newman, "and I hope to be completely exonerated. If the Grand Jury indicts me, then let it."

Mr. Dooling and Detective Curpitt, of the District Attorney's office, raided the office of Walter J. Pierce & Co., brokers, of 67 Wall Street, and carried away books and papers. Pierce is said to be in Texas looking after oil matters.

A New York lawyer, owner of a number of oil wells that are actually producing oil in the Texas fields, visited Mr. Dooling and described the methods of swindlers in the Texas fields.

One swindler, Mr. Dooling's informant said, sank a well and obtained little oil, but much gas. The swindler bottled up the oil and piped it back to the well. On a day set apart by this swindler a large audience came to witness the tapping of the well, and this time there was so much oil that it wrecked the rigging around the well. That day the swindler sold \$180,000 in stock, and the next day he was missing and the deception was discovered.

Mr. Dooling questioned William C. Stoddard, of the Dispatch Printing Company, of 2 Lafayette Street, which handled Rangeburnett advertising. Mr. Dooling also examined J. W. Neil, F. J. Coventry and C. D. Fomhof, employees of Pierce.

Among the papers which were found in the Pierce office, Mr. Dooling said, was the following telegram addressed to C. D. Fomhof, salesman of
