

30-Footers of N.Y.C. Race To Close Finish

Ogden Reid's Lena Wins From T. Clarke's Minx by 54-Second Margin

Starting in a light southeast breeze and finishing in a southeaster that had considerable strouth, twenty-nine yachts sailed in the annual regatta of the Orienta Yacht Club of Mamaroneck on Long Island Sound yesterday.

Practically all of the larger classes were sent over a 12 1/2-mile triangle, made up of a beat from the starting line of Delaney Point to a buoy off Matinecock Point. Then came a reach to a buoy off Execution Light, followed by a run home.

Three of the Long Island Sound schooners made up the largest class which started. The division was won by E. P. Akers' Allure, which defeated Moira, the property of Clarkson Cowly, by 2 minutes and 57 seconds.

The real fight around the triangle was seen in the thirty-foot division of the New York Yacht Club. Ogden Reid's Lena and Minx, the property of T. S. Clarke, had a great scrap, the former finally winning by 54 seconds, Mizpah, the property of D. Richardson, finished third.

Two of the Larchmont Inter-Club yachts also had a spirited fight over the same course. At the finish, Whit was nine seconds ahead of Sirene. In the Sonder class Mingo defeated Tern by 42 seconds.

Some of the little Stars crossed the starting line and the division was won by Little Bear. The winner was Altair, the property of Willis and Stannard, who defeated Hydra by 1 minute and 7 seconds over a six-mile course. The yachts finished in the same order in the regatta of the Knickerbocker Yacht Club a week ago.

The Bell Cats and the little one-design yachts of the home club started together and sailed over the six-mile course. The one-design yachts did the better work. The six-mile race was won in 1:36:12, almost a minute faster than Three Bells, the winner among the catboats. Van defeated Gnat for the prize by 42 seconds. The latter yacht is owned and sailed by Miss Mary Brooks, a yeowoman in the United States navy.
