The plan of the Allied and associated powers to make concessions to Germany with regard to ships and financial and economic measures if she signed the peace terms was deemed advisable to assure Germany a certain amount of financial and economic "working capital," without which it would be impossible for her to resume her industries or to pay reparations.

Details of Concessions Reserved. It was originally contemplated to include in the reply given the German people a definite and detailed statement on these concessions. For tactical reasons, however, the council determined to avoid precise advance assurances to the Germans, and thereupon made in the portion of the response devoted to reparations a general declaration, as follows: "The rebirth of German industry implies the possibility for the German people to receive supplies of food and for German manufacturers to receive necessary raw materials, as well as the means of transporting them from overseas to Germany."

There was considerable discussion between British and other experts as to the amount of general tonnage which should and could be placed at the disposal of Germany until new ships could be built. Estimates ranged between 25 and 30 per cent of vessels above 1,600 tons. All vessels in this category in existence at present are to be surrendered ultimately.

French to Supply Ores. The French also agreed to concessions, giving the Germans the right to purchase on favorable terms minette ores obtained before the war from French and German Lorraine, and which must be mixed with German low grade ores to obtain a good quality of iron and steel.

There were contemplated assurances concerning raw materials from overseas, it is said, are of the same general nature. All the concessions will be communicated to Germany soon after the signing of the treaty, probably at one of the first conferences with the permanent reparations commission.

German Press Thinks Allies Will Advance

Berlin Socialist Paper Says That Hostilities Will Reopen as Soon as Time Limit Expires. COPENHAGEN, June 18.—The amended peace terms have aroused a sentiment of growing implacability in Germany and armed intervention by the Allies is regarded as inevitable, according to the Berlin correspondent of the "Politiken."

Commenting on the Allied reply to the German counter-proposals the Frankfurt "Gazette" says: "Whatever we do will be terrible. Germany is in no position to refuse to sign the treaty when the signature is forced by an ultimatum. Let us resign ourselves to the inevitable and hope for a better future."

Final Terms Are Upheld By British Newspapers

LONDON, June 18.—Commenting on the final terms to the Germans, "The Daily Telegraph" says: "The original terms have stood an unexampled fire of criticism from every imaginable quarter and have survived it fairly well. They will be imposed substantially unchanged. All modifications now conceded have only one purpose—namely, to render the character of justice they display still more unmistakable."
