Buyers Swarm Market Again for Women's Apparel

Complaints About Prices Are Loudest From Purchasers of Medium and Lower Grades of Goods

More out of town buyers were in the market for women's wearing apparel yesterday than on any other day this season, according to several manufacturers.

Many manufacturers, especially in the cloak and suit trade, have revised the price tickets on their display samples upward since last week.

Increases in the number of orders over last week appear to be larger among dress and waist makers than among the sellers of coats and suits.

Fear of Strike in Silk Mills Holds Down Trade

Although demand for dress silks yesterday was of large volume, the scarcity of merchandise and fear of a general strike of mill operatives next Monday held down sales.

Some of the mill owners would be able to restrict production by placing orders when prices were far below those now prevailing.

Bids on Silk Cartridge Cloth Rejected by War Department

As the bids received for the government's surplus offering of 17,000,000 yards of silk cartridge cloth were deemed too low, the eighteen proposals from willing bidders have been rejected by the War Department.
