

Prince Amused By Regatta in Newfoundland

Royal Visitor Is Given Tremendous Ovation at Annual Event His Grand-sire Saw 60 Years Ago

Visit to U. S. Unsettled

Trip Over the Border Is Expected to Follow Journey to Western Canada

ST. JOHN'S N. F., Aug. 13.—The Prince of Wales received a tremendous ovation today from a large crowd of enthusiastic Newfoundlanders when he arrived at the annual regatta on Quidi Vidi Lake, two miles from this city.

Races End in Tragedy

After the Prince had left the regatta course a sudden wind squall overturned the motor boat and one of her crew, Charles Peters, a returned soldier, was drowned.

On his way through the village of Quidi Vidi, a typical fishing hamlet, the Prince displayed great interest in the process of curing fish, which was explained to him in detail.

Last night the Prince slept at Government House in the residence occupied in 1881 by his grandfather, the late King Edward VII, when he visited Newfoundland as Prince of Wales.

His decision has not yet been reached as to the exact date of his return to the United States.
