Rent profiteering cases involving service men to be turned over to the U. S. Attorneys this week

Grand Jury Will Act

Hirsch Committee Settles 763 Cases During Week on Tenant Complaints

Cases of rent profiteering in which the families of soldiers or sailors were the victims will be turned over to the United States Attorney for prosecution under the Federal soldiers and sailors' civil relief act.

The decision to transfer the cases to Federal jurisdiction was reached, Mr. Hirsch said, at a conference between members of the committee and Chandler Cobb, Assistant United States Attorney.

Cases Given Out

Among the cases involving dependents of men in military service Mr. Hirsch gave out the following: Lieutenant Arthur L. Vamodine, a tenant of 2612 Broadway, Manhattan, which is under the control of Jesse Sharp, of Sharp & Co., real estate agents, with offices at Broadway and Ninety-ninth Street.

Two Brothers in Service

Mrs. Meissner, 334 Fifty-first Street, Brooklyn, presented a grievance against her landlord, James M. Kenny, who raised her rent \$6 while she was dependent upon two brothers in service in the United States army.

Widow Complains

Mrs. Lennon, a widow of 510 East 163rd Street, Manhattan, pleaded a violation of the Federal act in that William H. Wiceliman, of the A. W. W. Company, Inc., 273 West 183rd Street, the Bronx, had raised her rent \$7, notwithstanding that she is dependent upon two sons now in the navy.

Vocational Board Is Declared Incompetent

Dealers in Quandary on Reporting Their Stocks

Request of Revenue Department Anticipates Measure to Compensate Owners

Liquor dealers throughout the country have been asked by the Internal Revenue Department to report the amount of whiskey, wines and cordials they had in stock on July 1. This action is in anticipation of a bill which is to be introduced in Congress to compensate owners of distilled beverages.


