

# 'Big 5' Plans Giant Trust, Senators Told

## Packers to Control Entire Food Supply of Country by 1925 Unless Curbed, Says Trade Commissioner

### Data on Combine Ready as Precaution Against Revolutionary Activities

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18.—The entire food supply of the United States will be in the hands of the "Big Five" packers by 1925 unless action is taken by Congress to curb their activities, W. B. Colver, a member of the Federal Trade Commission, told the Senate Committee on Agriculture to-day.

The 1920 model of the trust is bringing together the competing industries, Mr. Colver told the committee. "What will the 1925 model be," Senator Kenyon asked. "The 1925 model will be owning all the packing plants, controlling canneries of fresh vegetables and fruits, owning and controlling factories to turn cereals into food, controlling wholesale distributing plants and continuing on down to the retail store. They will leave nothing. I don't know how much further they can go unless they cut our food for us."

Two members of the committee urged passage of the bill before them for placing the packers under Federal control and a necessary precaution against revolutionary activities. "The people will no longer tolerate treasonable profits by those who have acquired monopoly of the necessities of life," said Senator Kenyon, author of the bill. "This is not a bill for government ownership; it simply is a bill for Federal regulation of the packers. It divorces the packers from stockyard and refrigeration concerns."

"We despise anarchy and violence, but we know of revolutions that have been justifiable," Senator Gronna, chairman of the committee, said. "It does seem that those who control great corporations should carefully view the present situation."

Mr. Colver told the committee the packers "have already set up in England the sort of a monopoly of food they will have perfected in the United States by 1925, unless action is taken to regulate the industry."

In England the five big packers (Swift, Armour, Morris, Cudahy and Wilson) have a control that runs down to the retailer," he said. "These gentlemen now have in England in thirty-four cities over sixty-four wholesale meat distributing plants and over 1,000 retail meat shops. It seems that the 1925 model of the trust having its trial run."

**Says Profits Are Hidden**  
Mr. Colver insisted that the efforts of the packers to convince the public that they are not making large earnings is an attempt to cover hidden profits.

Replying to statements by representatives of the packers that the Federal Trade Commission has not made public all the correspondence it secured during its investigation, Mr. Colver revealed that the Department of Justice has been at work ten months building up a case against the packers out of the evidence secured by the Federal Trade Commission. It is upon this evidence, he said, that the proposed anti-trust suits against the packers will be brought.

# Would Give Wilson Control Of All Profits

## Urges Action Now To Save Government

### Senator Walsh Predicts "Violent Explosions" Unless H. C. of L. Drops

WASHINGTON, Aug. 18.—Leaders of both political parties in the House and Senate were called upon by Senator David L. Walsh, Democrat, of Massachusetts, in the Senate this afternoon to summon conferences of their followers and map out a programme of immediate action to reduce the high cost of living.

Unrest and distrust of government were spreading throughout the land, he said, because of the failure of Congress to step forward and meet the problem. He predicted violent explosions in all the principal cities if action was much longer delayed.

Senator Thomas, of Colorado, and Senator King, of Utah, both Democrats, told Senator Walsh the present problem was one that could not be completely solved by Congress. Instead of creating the impression that Congress could hand out a remedy if it would, Senator King said, it was the duty of Senators to appeal to the people to be patient and patriotic until the world recovered from the sickness wrought by the war.

Senator Walsh said he was asked only about the high cost of living on a recent trip to Massachusetts, and not about the league of nations or the peace treaty.

"It is the cause of all the unrest, strikes, and the disordered condition of business. It is causing distrust of the government itself. The people are asking, 'Have we a government? It is capable of grappling with this problem? They are appealing to this body expecting it to meet the situation and find a solution.'"

"It is ten days since the President called attention to this problem and suggested remedies. I call for action on these recommendations now because this is the only way of stopping unrest and saving the government itself."

"What can we do? I say Congress could restore confidence at once by the announcement in this chamber that the steering committees of the Republican and Democratic parties had been called together to map out a programme of immediate action."

"This question is not a party issue," Senator Walsh asserted "it is an American issue. We should sit down together to meet it. It seems to me if such a course were taken it would do much to restore confidence in our form of government."

# 2,000 Tons of Meats In Buffalo Warehouses

## Brest Stores Invaded; Mobs Force Price Cuts

### Buffalo, Aug. 18.—Nearly 4,000,000 pounds of dressed and cured meats have been located in fruit storage warehouses in Niagara County, according to a message sent to Attorney General Palmer to-day by District Attorney Lockwood.

The message quotes a local agent of a packing company as saying the fruit storage space was bought because all Western meat stores are filled.

Labels were begun in Federal court to-day against firms and individuals owning 3,000,000 dozen eggs and 3,500,000 pounds of butter, alleged to have been "withheld from the market for the purpose of unreasonably increasing the price."

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# Says Packers Grip N. Y. Fish Market

## Mayor Gillan of Newark Tells House Members of Fight With Dealers

### WASHINGTON, Aug. 18.—Charges that the "Big Five" meat packers control the New York fish market, thus holding a complete monopoly over all fish taken out of the ocean along the Jersey coast, were made before the House Agriculture Committee to-day by Mayor Gillan of Newark, one of fifteen New Jersey Mayors to appear before that committee.

The mayors vigorously demanded that Congress stop "investigating" and tackle the high cost of living harder. They laid down a programme of legislation which they thought Congress should enact, with the following main provisions:

1. Creation of a Federal commission to regulate food exports.
2. Control or operation by the government of all cold storage warehouses.
3. Acquisition by the government of all refrigeration cars.
4. Provision that during the present emergency, or any future emergency of high living costs, the government should undertake to sell direct to the public, not only food, but clothing and shoes.
5. Provision that the government release to the public forthwith all remaining surpluses of food and clothing.

"A year ago," Mayor Gillan told the committee, "the municipality of Newark discovered the fish dealers of that city were selling only the more expensive kind of fish, and the poor people were unable to get the cheaper grades, such as ling, herring and whiting."

Upon investigation we found the New York fish market, or Fulton Market, controlled the entire catch along the Jersey coast, and discouraged fishermen were instructed either to throw all such fish back into the water or turn them over to fertilizer plants.

"So the city of Newark arranged with some fishermen to bring direct to Newark catches of these cheaper fish, and we placed them on sale direct to the public. The experiment proved an immediate success, but after about three weeks the supply of the cheaper grades began mysteriously to drop off. The men who supplied us the fish gave various vague excuses that these grades of fish were no longer in abundance or had moved away from the Jersey coast, and finally the supply was cut off altogether. We traced the influence, we believe, to the big wholesale fish combination in New York and found the State of New Jersey was powerless to effect a remedy."

"Have you any proofs that the Big Five packers control the New York fish market?" demanded Representative Anderson, of Minnesota.

"No proof, but a firm conviction is in our community that this is a fact, and we are morally certain an investigation would disclose it to be fact," replied Mayor Gillan.


